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

Golf Week Magazine calls it one of the top 15 courses in Pennsylvania and the best public course in the state. It is a true championship course.

Adding to the excitement of this year's tournament weekend is the introduction of "Monte Carlo Night," to be held Friday evening as part of our annual pretournament golfers reception at the Pittsburgh Airport Marriott. After enjoying complimentary food and refreshments, golfers and guests will be invited to try their luck at various casino games that will be set up in the hotel ballroom. It promises to be a fun evening and a grand beginning to our fraternal weekend.

Our 18-hole tournament will begin the next morning with a shotgun start at 8:30 a.m. Play will be straight scramble. Along the course, golfers will have the chance to win prizes as part of our traditional skill shot contests, including longest drive, longest putt, closest to the pin and closest to the line. All golfers will also enjoy the use of GPS-equipped carts and a sandwich and beverage at the turn.

Our weekend's official activities will conclude with the annual golf barbeque to be held at the Quicksilver Golf Club immediately following the tournament.

The values upon which the first fraternal benefit society was founded 140 years ago are what will keep fraternalism alive for the next generation of members.

few years after the close of the Civil War, a master mechanic in the railroad shops at Meadville, Pa., conceived the idea of organizing his fellow workers to introduce his "ideas of right and justice between man and man." The year was 1868, and John J. Upchurch organized Jefferson Lodge No. 1 of the Ancient Order of United Workmen.

This was the beginning of the vast American fraternal system, which today is composed of more than 100 fraternal benefit societies in the United States with millions of members.

Each fraternal benefit society operates under a representative form of government, for the benefit of the membership and without profit.

No member of any fraternal benefit society who is consistent in maintaining his or her membership need ever hope in vain for a friend, because he or she will have many. He need not go without comfort in sickness because there will be a brother or sister member there to look after his wants.

Most of our fraternal benefit societies originated as brotherly organizations comprised of those who spoke the language of a shared homeland but were now living in a new country. Their racial ties were strengthened by fraternal ties of mutual aid and encouragement during trying days in the lives of the membership.

Our ethnic-based societies devoted much to the spirit and cause of fraternity in those days. When the tide of immigration was at its height, it was unnecessary to canvas for new members. New arrivals joined the local branches on their own accord and sheer desire to be among their own countrymen. In those days, the immigrants lived more or less together in communities.

Today, the problem is somewhat different. People of a shared ethnic heritage live scattered over the length and breadth of the United States. We must make the attempt to reach those who moved away from the inner cities. We must recruit our young people into our folds at any cost. The future of our fraternal benefit societies depends on juvenile membership. We must implement plans for attracting young people on whose shoulders rest the responsibility for a successful future.

Our societies need cooperation between adults and youths. Age can provide wisdom, experience and, perhaps, money. Youth can provide a guarantee of comparative immortality, vision and working muscles.

When we call upon our young people to come and be our brothers and sisters in our fraternal organizations, we must do so with the intention not only of giving them protection in the form of life insurance but also of assisting them in their social life so that they may claim their place in this world as honest and good citizens.

So what is Fraternalism? It is defined in many ways, but, basically, it is caring about others. If you are a church member, you witness your church performing many acts of fraternalism, such as caring for the elderly or providing help for people in less fortunate circumstances. There are many organizations which perform such acts of fraternalism, such as the Red Cross and Salvation Army. Some 50 years ago, while I spent some time

in a refuge camp in Austria-Germany and in Camp Kilmer, N.J., both of these organizations helped me a great deal, which I will never forget.

At that time, I was sponsored by a church from Camp Kilmer.

The fraternal groups produce many benefits through fraternal activities, including scholarship programs, food banks, Habitat for Humanity and countless others. The benefits these fraternal activities produce would never be realized by the people who need them if it were not for our churches, our supportive agencies and our fraternal benefit societies.

We in the fraternal benefit system also recognize the need for families to function financially after the death of a loved one, and we provide means to assist in that regard.

The supportive agencies who restore dignity and balance after disasters or tragedies are another arm of fraternalism. All of these support systems work together to bring families together and restore balance. But, where did these values originate? How did these agencies and societies come about? Who ultimately constructed such a caring system?

I believe it came from a fraternal heart--people who care about one another, people who want to help one another. This is what led to the establishment of our churches and their tradition of living their strong faith. This is what led to the creation of supportive agencies whose work is to serve their fellow human beings. And this is what led to the formation of fraternal benefit societies who saw the need for financial stability after the death of a loved one.

Thankfully, we live in a country that enforces these values. The reward is the satisfaction in knowing that our goal transcends all others--the goal of serving our fellow man. WPL



AHF honors environmentalist, public servant

NEW BRUNSWICK, NJ - A highly successful young environmentalist and an extremely active public servant were honored April 25 during the American Hungarian Foundation's 46th Anniversary Carousel Ball held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in New Brunswick.

Tom Szaky, founder and chief executive officer of TerraCycle, was presented the Foundation's Abraham Lincoln Award. Also honored was Melonie Krisza Marano, mayor of Green Brook, N.J., who received the Distinguished Service Award.

Szaky was born in Budapest in 1982 and emigrated with his family as political refugees first to Holland and then to Canada in 1989. At the age of 14 he started his first business, an award-winning web design company, and later helped start three small Internet companies.

He came to the United States in 2001 and attended Princeton University, but left college to form

TerraCycle, Inc., known for organic plant food. From a two-man operation in the basement of an old office building in Princeton, TerraCyle now occupies a 20,000-square-foot factory in Trenton where it employs about 45 workers. It is a "second chance employer" which hires veterans, exconvicts, former drug addicts and the homeless to work as part of a team. It is one of the faster growing organic and eco-friendly companies in the country and sells its products through numerous retailers, including Home Depot, Wal-Mart, Target and Whole Foods.

Marano, whose maternal grandparents emigrated from Hungary in the early 1900s, is a graduate of Rider College. After earning a degree in accounting, she worked for a public accounting firm and then for the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) for 11 years. She later worked for another music licensing group, SESAC.

In 2003, she ran for a seat on the Green Brook Township Committee as a Democrat, becoming the first member of her party to win such a seat in more than 20 years. In 2009, her peers on the township committee appointed her mayor, the township's first Democratic mayor in 46 years.

She has served on the Green Brook Environmental Commission; Green Brook Flood Control Commission; Green Brook Cultural, Heritage and Historical Preservation Committee; Green Brook Design Group; Planning Board and Elder Affairs Committe.

Dedicated to fostering volunteerism, Marano was the creator and chair of Green Brook's annual Volunteer Day, which attracts about 400 volunteers to clean up the town. She has also served as a Girl Scout leader, religious school teacher, Junior Achievement consultant and chair of the 2008 Red Cross Heroes fundraising campaign.

Great Grilling

FÁRADJON BE A MAGYAR KONYHÁBA.

The winter is officially gone, and now we can enjoy the best of the spring and summer seasons.

Keeping that in mind, it's time to take the cover off the gas grill, brush off the cobwebs and get set to cook some great food. If you don't have a gas grill, get on over to Home Depot or Wal-Mart and get your charcoal briquettes and starting fluid.

Before we get started, let's do some housekeeping with WPA events. Don't forget your suggestions are always welcome by email or snail mail AND I answer all my mail!

The *William Penn Life* has details about the upcoming Hungarian Room dinner at the University of Pittsburgh on June 13.

There is still room in the Hungarian Heritage Experience at Penn Scenic View which is scheduled for the first week of August.

Our golf tournament at the wonderful Quicksilver Golf Course is a "go" and more information about it can be found in this issue. Don't forget to read the *William Penn Life* to find out about local Hungarian happenings in your area.

Last, but not least, the monthly trivia question: *Where did the term "barbeque" originate*? The tasty answer is cooking on the grill!

When we talk about grilling, the first things that come up are the words "barbeque" and "cookout." These words do not mean the same thing. Barbecue is a whole different style of food and menu than what you would serve at a cookout.

Cookout is what you do at a barbeque. A cookout is where you literally cook *out* of the house. Let me add that *grilling* is what you do at a barbeque. Grilling is the art of cooking using a radiant heat method usually provided by charcoal or a steady flame source that is under or completely surrounding the food. Most folks have a gas or charcoal grill in their yard or on the patio or back porch. If you live near the beach like I do, you can dig a pit, fill it with hot coals and have a pit barbeque.

Follow my simple tips and you

Dinner for 4

Kirántott Csirke (Breaded Chicken)

3-pound chicken cut into eight pieces
3 whole eggs
4 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons Hungarian paprika
½ cup bread crumbs
Lard for frying

Beat the eggs in a deep dish. Mix the flour with paprika and set aside. Dust the chicken with the flour, then dip in egg wash and coat with breadcrumbs. Fry in the hot shortening until golden brown on all sides. Serve with mashed potatoes and a fresh vegetable. will enjoy tasty food on your grill.

Marinate meats in a liquid marinade before grilling for extra flavor, but watch the amount of oil you use in the marinade. The oil will catch fire and leave your food with a sooty film, and it won't taste that great either.

Try dry rubs on ribs and chicken for extra flavor and slow cook these foods, turning often to make sure they cook evenly. If you want the best ribs, marinate them overnight then slow cook on the grill. Pork ribs in my opinion are the best to grill.

You can also grill steaks, veal chops and pork loins, just remember to keep turning to cook evenly. When these meats are almost cooked to your desired temperature, brush on some sauce to cook on extra flavor.

If you like seafood, try thick pieces of fish or large shrimp. Just remember seafood is quicker to cook than meats because of less connective tissue in the meat. Try lighter barbaque sauces or a citrus juice for great flavor.

For side dishes, I like veggies lightly tossed in vinaigrette then grilled until al dente. Add a freshly made salad and you're all set for some great eating. Happy grilling and enjoy the recipes this month.

Trivia answer: The French originated the term as it was originally pronounced "barbe a queue," which roughly translated means from "beard to tail." The earliest recorded barbeques featured whole animals which were gutted then cooked and served.

Basic BBQ Sauce

- 4 garlic cloves, minced 2 large onions, diced small
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 16 oz. tomato puree
- 24 ounces whole tomatoes in juice
- 9 oz. cider vinegar
- 4 tablespoons brown sugar
- I tablespoon kosher salt
- I tablespoon black pepper
- I tablespoon Hungarian paprika
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 2 tablespoons molasses
- 2 oz. orange juice concentrate
- I tablespoon liquid smoke
- 4 tablespoons smooth Dijon mustard

In a heavy bottom sauté pan, heat oil and sauté the garlic for 30 seconds, add the onions and cook until the onions are nicely caramelized, approximately five to eight minutes. Add all remaining ingredients, bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for two hours; the longer you cook the sauce, the more the acidity is reduced. Purée in a blender until smooth or serve chunky style to your guests.

Magyar BBQ Rub

- 8 tablespoons Hungarian sweet paprika
- 4 tablespoons Kosher salt 4 tablespoons brown sugar

- 4 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 4 tablespoons ground cumin
- 4 tablespoons chili powder
- 4 tablespoons black pepper
- I teaspoon cayenne pepper
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground clove

Combine all ingredients and mix well.

Basic BBQ Sauce

- I cup prepared yellow mustard
- ³/₄ cup cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1/4 cup honey
- 2 tablespoons peanut oil
- 2 ¹/₂ teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- I teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- ¹/₄ teaspoon cayenne pepper

In a small stainless-steel or other nonreactive saucepan, combine the mustard, vinegar, molasses, honey, peanut oil and Worcestershire sauce; whisk to combine. Continue stirring while bringing to a simmer over medium-high heat. Add the salt, white pepper, black pepper and cayenne, and whisk to combine. Reduce the heat to maintain a simmer and let the sauce cook for another five minutes, stirring occasionally. Let cool to room temperature before using.

Nagymama's Recept*

Ischli Fánk (Cookie Sandwiches)

- ³/₄ cup unsalted butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon grated lemon rind
- ³/₄ cup confectioner's sugar
- I whole egg
- 1/2 cup ground hazelnuts
- 1¹/₂ cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cocoa powder

Cream the butter and sugar until soft, then gradually add the sugar and mix thoroughly. Add the egg and lemon rind and beat until light and fluffy. Blend in the ground nuts. Sift together the flour, cinnamon and cocoa, then add to the mixture in small amounts, mixing after each addition. Put dough in refrigerator for 20 minutes, then roll out dough to ¹/₄ - inch thickness. Cut into rounds with a cookie cutter and place on a cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes in a preheated oven. Make cookie sandwiches from two rounds. Fill with apricot or raspberry jam.

William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc. Eligibility Rules for Year 2009 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

a) The **student** applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual Life Benefit Member of the William Penn Association for four (4) years. A Life Benefit Member is an individual who is insured for life or endowment benefits.

b) On both renewal and new applications, **the applicant must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of the William Penn Association in good standing.** For the 2009 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a Life Benefit Member for at least four (4) years as of January I, 2009.

c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.

d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period. The student must notify the President of the Scholarship Foundation, by letter, postmarked no later than May 31, 2009, that the student desires to receive a scholarship grant. It is recommended that the letter be sent via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date. E-Mail notification will NOT be accepted as proof of notification.

e) First-time applicants must submit the following:

I. **WPA Scholarship Application** on forms furnished by the Scholarship Foundation. Forms may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233.

2. **A Slogan** (Marketing Catch Phrase) for the WPA, such as the well-known slogans "Have It Your Way" (Burger King), "Think Outside the Bun" (Taco Bell), and "Do the Dew" (Mountain Dew).

The Scholarship Application and Slogan must be mailed and postmarked by May 31, 2009.

3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.

4. A copy of the student's SAT/ACT scores or waiver letter from the school in which enrolled.

5. Proof of enrollment for the coming school year in September.

Items 3, 4 and 5 must be submitted by September 30, 2009.

f) Renewal applicants must submit the following:

I. A letter requesting a renewal grant.

2. **A Slogan** (Marketing Catch Phrase) for the WPA, such as the well-known slogans "Have It Your Way" (Burger King), "Think Outside the Bun" (Taco Bell), and "Do the Dew" (Mountain Dew).

The Renewal Letter and Slogan must be mailed and postmarked by May 31, 2009.

3. A copy of the student's **latest scholastic record.** All renewal applicants **must maintain no lower than a 2.5** GPA on a 4.0 scale to qualify.

4. Proof of enrollment for the new term in September.

Items 3 and 4 must be submitted by September 30, 2009.

g) All requests for an application and renewal letters must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Letters submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. E-Mails will NOT be accepted.

h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided **the student** is a member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.

i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.

j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.

k) All applications and renewal letters must be postmarked no later than **May 31, 2009.** Any applications or renewal letters postmarked after that date will not be considered.


