

### WPA Chairman Varga elected chairman of Hungarian American Coalition

WASHINGTON -- WPA Chairman of the Board Steven J. Varga took over the rotating chairmanship of the Hungarian American Coalition during the Coalition's 18th Annual General and Board Meetings held Dec. 5, 2009, in Washington, D.C.

Other representatives of the WPA attending the meeting were Vice Chairman of the Board Barbara A. House, National Director William J. Bero and National Vice President-Fraternal Endre Csoman.

The Coalition also renewed the Board memberships of the WPA as well as those of numerous organizations representing the American Hungarian community.

The Hungarian American Coalition is a nationwide non-profit organization that promotes public understanding of issues of Hungarian American interest.

About 25 Coalition members attended a White House briefing Dec. 4, hosted by Jeff Hovenier, director for Central and Eastern Europe, National Security Council.

Later that evening, the WPA delegation and Coalition members attended the traditional Mikulás

Dinner hosted by the Hungarian Embassy. Among the guests were Hungarian Prime Minister Gordon Bajnai and Prof. János Martonyi, former minister of foreign affairs of Hungary.

In his remarks, Mr. Bajnai described the importance of U.S.-Hungarian relations and reported on Hungary's increased commitment to NATO's multinational forces in Afghanistan. He stressed the need to continue the reforms and austerity measures he introduced last spring after becoming prime minister.

Prof. Martonyi, the evening's keynote speaker, spoke about Hungary's role and responsibilities arising from its membership in the EU and NATO and its partnership with the U.S. Noting that Hungary is a small country, he stressed that size does not matter, as "the most important things in life, such as honor, integrity, courage, love or patriotism cannot be quantified."

We congratulate Chairman Varga on his election as chairman of the Coalition and wish him and the Coalition well in the coming year.

## Hungary aims for economic recovery after rough period

BUDAPEST -- Hungary, plagued by a bad reputation in the handling of its financial affairs, went a long way in 2009 to changing that image to set the stage for next year's hoped-for start of an economic recovery.

It's a stark contrast to 2008, a year when Hungary confirmed its bad reputation in financial circles by becoming the first EU country to require an international bail-out amid the global financial crisis.

But the country closed the year with one of the EU's healthiest budget balances, potentially giving it a head start when the economy finally begins to pick up.

The crisis management has been painful, however. At the grassroots level, there have been protests against cutbacks from rail workers, firefighters and teachers--and even a threat by hospital directors to go on hunger strike over cash shortages.

Moreover, the finance ministry predicts the economy will have shrunk by a whopping 6.7 percent by the end of the year, and it is not

expected to start growing again before 2011.

Meanwhile, unemployment has climbed above 10 percent.

While some countries were trying to spend their way out of recession by pouring money into fiscal stimulation packages, strict conditions attached to the bail-out by the International Monetary Fund meant Hungary had little choice but to retrench.

After Socialist premier Ferenc Gyurcsany stood down in March, a new interim government headed by Prime Minister Gordon Bajnai immediately took an axe to public spending.

Drastic pension cutbacks and the abolition of "13th month" payments to public sector workers were combined with a hike in sales tax from 20 to 25 percent.

The 2010 budget bill means further cuts next year, with local authorities, ministries and the state-owned railway network all on the chopping block.

### Slovak minister regrets tensions

from Hungary Around The Clock
The past six months in relations
between Hungary and Slovakia were
especially hard and unpleasant "and
what happened damaged both
countries in the eyes of the world,"
Slovak Foreign Minister Miroslav
Lajcák said in an interview with a
Slovak website.

"It would be irresponsible of me to blame the Hungarian side exclusively for the worsening atmosphere," he said, adding that the presence of the far right Slovak National Party in Slovakia's ruling coalition is "an umbrella under which many people could put many things."

Lajcák said Hungary had used adjectives in regard to Slovakia that

do not belong in the vocabulary of EU and NATO allies. "Some mentioned Nuremberg laws, racism, fascism, and I have to draw attention to the emotional campaign waged against us in the European Parliament."

He blamed among others the Hungarian media, intelligentsia and civil society for the present tensions between the two nations.

Lajcák underlined that intergovernmental relations should be rationalized after parliamentary elections in both countries next year.

"We cannot allow ourselves to have such a bad four years as the past half year was, because then both countries would hurt their international reputation," he said.

### AHF honors three at annual awards dinner

NEW YORK CITY - The American Hungarian Foundation honored three outstanding individuals with its annual George Washington Award during a blacktie dinner Nov. 18 a the Waldorf Astoria Hotel.

The award honors those who have made eminent contributions to the arts, society, commerce, industry, the broad fields of human knowledge and understanding among men and nations.

Honored were H. Kirk Brown III and his wife Jill A. Wiltse.
Together, they have assembled a major Hungarian art collection and founded On Screen, a non-profit organization which produces films on architects and designers.

The third honoree was Christian L. Sauska, founder of Light Sources, Inc., of Orange, Conn.

### One-fourth of Hungarians got H1N1 vaccination

BUDAPEST -- One in four Hungarians has been inoculated against the HINI virus, placing Hungary behind only Sweden and the Netherlands, Health Minister Tamás Székely said Dec 22..

The number of residents consulting doctors about HINI symptoms dropped at the end of December thanks to the vaccines.

National chief medical officer Ferenc Falus said 2.5 million people have been inoculated in Hungary against HINI and an estimated 500,000 have contracted the virus.

A 48-year-old man became Hungary's 45th fatality attributed to the new flu at Nagykanizsa's Dorottya Hospital. He had not received the vaccine.

semester finals. I now know the true meaning of the infamous, all nighters.

When we go from one era of our life to another, we seldom recognize the end of that juncture in time.

One late night towards the end November, I couldn't sleep (mostly due to the fact that earlier in the evening our family had the last szallona sütes roast/fire of the year and I had some latent acid indigestion). While my family slept, my mind began to wander, and I started to think of how just a few years earlier things were a lot more carefree and fun.

I recalled spending countless hours in the loft of the barn running model trains. I thought of my nagymama holding my hand as we danced a czardas at the Northeast Ohio Hungarian Cultural Center, then taking me to play on the cool gym and swing set under the trees.

Those days will never return, but the memories remain.

I remembered my grandma's funeral and how sad we all were. My dad cried, my Aunt Jenny just held me and sobbed. I thought *nagymama* was sleeping. I saw one of my grandfather's friends that I met countless times at picnics and dances. He played some sad sounding songs with his violin. It seemed as if he was playing just for my grandmother as she lay sleeping in that big fancy box. (Several years later, I learned that the man with the violin was the famous Frank Borisz, and that he played several special songs only heard at Magyar funerals)

As the long, quiet and sleepless night ticked away, I looked at my nightstand and saw a paper folded in half. As I opened it, I began to read it silently to myself. It was the invitation to the annual William Penn Christmas party. I saw that it was addressed to my sister Elizabeth. The party took place on December 5th at Mindszenty Hall at Our Lady of Hungary Church.

I began to think of parties past and the fun and

all of the neat stuff that we got there over the years. The toys always seemed to be multidimensional in operation. Each different toy would either light up or spin or do a combination of movements and flashes.

I remembered Santa, the ice cream, my brother Endre II playing the cimbalom as Evie and Mr. Goda's daughter led the sing-a-long. When I was really young, I'd give my grandfather the pill holders, emery boards and money sponges that expanded about three times the original size when placed in a bowl of water.

On that restless early morning, I thought of those good old days and how I could not be part of it again.

Finally, my stomach ache started to subside, I was tired, but my thoughts of those old memories continued to keep me awake. I reached down and opened the third drawer of the nightstand. I pulled out an old toy from a Branch 28 Christmas party. My brother and I called it "The Spinning Scepter of Light." We used them like light sabers. The neighborhood kids wanted them. They loved the red, blue and greenish-yellow LEDs and how they spun and vibrated. As I picked up the multicolored light toy, I said to myself, "Will it still work?" Sure enough, it did! I played with it for several minutes. It kind of hypnotized me, and I dozed off.

The next morning, I opened my eyes only to see my brother Endre playing with the Scepter. For the next few minutes we shared our memories of the spinning light saber.

It's nice to know some things never change. Did you see the 2009 WPA Christmas toy? A clear LED yoyo that howls and lights up when spun and retracted. The tradition of great William Penn Christmas toys continues!


If you have not told anyone about the William Penn Association, now is the time to do so. If


