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
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


Holiday Greetings from the Chair

## 125th Anniversary Celebrations

**Branch 28** On Sunday, Oct. 23, Branch 28 joined with the Youngstown Hungarian Freedom Fighters for a special event at Youngstown's Franciscan Friary, celebrating the 125th anniversary of William Penn Association and the 55th anniversary of the Hungarian Revolution of 1956.

The day started with an outdoor memorial service at the 1956 eternal flame and statue, led by the Rev. Joseph Rudjak of Our Lady of Hungary Catholic Parish. Songs were sung and remarks were made by Frank Schauer and Leslie Polgar.

The attendees then gathered in the Friary's social hall for a stuffed cabbage buffet dinner.

The dinner began with welcoming remarks from Branch 28 Coordinator and National Director Kathy Novak, who asked Branch 28 President Steve Novak to lead the group in the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the singing of the National Anthem. The invocation was offered by the Rev. Robert Bonnet, pastor of Christ Our Savior Roman Catholic Parish in Struthers. Ohio.

Before the meal was served, the Hungarian community took the opportunity to honor two dedicated members of the Youngstown Hungarian community for their years of service to the preservation of the Hungarian culture. Maria Goda and Steve Novak were introduced with brief biographies detailing their service and both were awarded certificates, flowers and gifts. Both honorees were unaware they were to be honored, mak-

The event was also used to honor

those members of Branch 28 who had achieved 50 years of membership in WPA. Six members were invited to the affair to receive this honor, but, unfortunately, they were unable to attend. Their certificates of achievement will be mailed to them.

Special guests attending the event were National Vice President-Fraternal Endre Csoman and his wife Arlene, National Director Richard Sarosi and his parents Ernie and Violet, and Branch 14 President Caroline Lanzara.

We again thank all those who attended this celebration and thank the event committee for all their hard work in preparing this special day.

## Budgeting your money

## Karácsony A time to reminisce and reflect

WITH EACH PASSING HOLIDAY SEASON, I find myself placing more emphasis on family, beliefs and friends and less on gifts and commercially created pageantry. And for my family, the kitchen is the focal point for most of our holiday activities. Sure, we have a Christmas tree in each room of the house, but the real feel of our Magyar Christmas is found in the cooking area.

For me, Halloween is the starting point for almost 10 weeks of planning, preparation and family fun; it seems that everyday we are doing something special in regards to Karácsony. It may be the retrieval of our many boxes of Christmas regalia or the plotting of recipes to be used for baking or cooking. By mid-November, several dozen boxes of Christmas Tupperware containers begin to mysteriously migrate from the Cseh basement (for obvious reasons, we have nicknamed our cellar, "the catacombs") to the main floor fover. My anyam strictly enforces the rule that only she is authorized to look inside each chest that yields our yuletide treasures. During the two-week cycle of container accumulation and accounting, mom slowly designates each particular box to take residence in a certain room. We dare not to even sneak a peek into any plastic storage carton for fear of losing some body part or realignment of an olfactory mem-

brane. She has a sixth sense that tells her

if any container has been even slightly

tampered with.

I have three personal favorite Christmas trees in my home. The tree that displays all of the handcrafted decorations made by my brother, sister and me is my second most favored. That is followed by our Magyar themed *fenyő*. But, a tiny 15-inch tall miniature evergreen that originally belonged to my great-grandmother, Menci

Kadi Cseh, is by far my favorite.

She brought it over from Csot, Veszprém, Hungary, in 1913. When I gaze at the tree and the small red berries interspersed among the branches, my mind begins to drift back in time. The tree gives me a soul-searching association to a loved one I never knew; I was born 20 years after her passing. Other than pictures and occasional stories about her from my Aunt Olga or father, any historical link to her as a forebears is minimal. For me, this little "Charlie Brown Look-A-Like Tree" is a spiritual connection to her. I feel her presence and love radiate from deep within those tiny green branches. I know it sounds crazy, but it is what I feel whenever I am by it. Ironically, I sense no fright or scary movie sensation, but that of a warm, cuddly inner glow that one has when holding and sipping a rich cup of steamy hot chocolate.

As we enter the week of Thanksgiving, our attention centers upon that fourth Thursday of the month of November. The food preparation for our national day of thanks is a mere warm up for the big holidays of late December and early January. We defy all health warnings and deep fry our turkey. The

pies are laden with cream and sweeteners. The health rendorseg must be cringing all the way to Washington, D.C., with the seemingly endless array of fat, salt and cholesterol laden substances that are part of our holiday food menu.

Right around Veteran's Day, my brother Endre II, begins to practice on his cimbalom the Christmas carols and songs that

he will play for the various parties and get-togethers during December. The highlight of his holiday playing performance schedule is, of course, Branch 28's Christmas bash. He especially enjoys performing for this event because so many children attend.

The natural curiosity of those youngsters make him the cimbalom version of "The Pied Piper." For him, it is also a homecoming of sorts. He

meets and plays special requests for many members of the Youngstown Hungarian Club. Irene Nemeth, Dee Gran and Frank Tobias want to hear "Csak Egy Kislany." Another annual tradition is when he plays for Mrs. Goda, "Az A Szép." Twin sisters Margie Dubos and Betty Anzivino join in a Magyar sing-along of "Pasztorok." Endre tries to stump Branch 28 President Steve Novak

with a little known song. Mr. Novak can identify and hum along to every song Endre II plays. Last year, my brother learned to play an obscure carol, "Bring the Torch Isabella." He thought for sure he would stump "Uncle Steve" (as Mr. Novak is affectionately referred to by the Cseh children). Before my brother could play more than a few bars of the song, Mr. Novak announced the song's title.

Do you have an interesting Karácsony ritual, cookie or custom that would be neat for me to know about? Possibly in a future Tibor's Take, I could tell your story. Please let me know about it! Boldog Újévet!

This year my brother will try to stump Uncle Steve with a Christmas selection from a book titled, "Christmas Carols: A Hungarian Collection." It was researched and translated by the late Elizabeth Leffler Szabo and the Rev. Nicholas Dengl, OFM, in 1984. This limited edition compilation of popular and seldom heard *Karácsonyi* songs came from the various Christian denominations found in Hungary. This hard covered book was printed to help celebrate the Magyar Friary's 90th anniversary. It not only contains much research, but also houses many colorful woodblock prints by master artisan Ferenc Bitto. (The Hungarian Friars also have published numerous prayer books, my parent's elaborately decorated wedding invitations and the famous "Catholic Hungarians' Sunday.") This wonderful volume of music and art should be reprinted. It is a must have for any Hungarian-American family interested in learning about our Magyar culture and history.

Early December begins the baking cycle of a wide variety of traditional Magyar cakes and cookies. On any given day during the final month of the year, I can come home to a cornucopia of smells inundating the kitchen area. When the fragrance of hot percolated coffee mixes in with the sweet pungent odors of cinnamon, nutmeg and maple, a nasal overload takes place. We enjoy such taste experiences as hold alakú sütemények (moon cakes), csoroge (angel wings), kalács, kifli or gingerbread, to name just a few.

We bake and cook a lot, but our family's holiday baking extravaganza can't measure up to the kifli/édes tészta repertoire of Cissy, her daughter Christine and Uncle Sonny. Their efforts give new meaning to the word "bakery." Right around Szt. Mikulás Nap, Sonny and Sandor Tollas, (grand patriarch of the Tollas család) go up to Cissy's home along the shores of Lake Erie for a Karácsonyi cookie marathon. For several days they sequester themselves from the outside world and produce dozens of different pastries and cookies. Every morsel of sweet and savory goodness produced from this home bakery is designated for friends and family. The high water mark of their efforts is the creation of the family's legendary "Clothespin Cookies." My család receives several plates of

these wonderfully crafted and flavored treats.

My family is proud to be the longtime hosts of a Hungarian radio program, started in 1979 by my *nagypapa*, *nagymama* and father. From a broadcasting and sentimental standpoint, the Christmas season is one of deep sorrow and deliberation for me. The Saturday before Christmas 2003, my *nagypapa* Cseh hosted the radio broadcast along with my dad, brother and little sister. Although he lived another four months, that show would prove to be his last. The 28 steps going up to the broadcast facility of WK-TL-FM were just too much for him. I remember my dad suggesting to him that we could use the wheelchair that was once used by my dearly departed great-grandmother Silvers to help him pull him up the steps just as we did for her 25 years earlier. Unfortunately, he in uncertain terms said, "NO!"

Beginning the Saturday following Thanksgiving, and continuing to the Saturday prior to the New Year, we play mostly Hungarian Christmas songs. We have so many wonderful records celebrating the season. My personal favorite is "Hungarian Christmas Carols," by the Lakatos Sandor *Zenekar*. The album features vocals by Magyar singing star Sari Barabas. The violins set a mood for the holiday. For this recording only, the cimbalom player wrapped his mallets with aluminum foil, giving the percussion instrument a crisp, metal sound reminding one of a cold-blowing wind and snow. Ms. Barabas and her resonating soprano offer an angelic tonal effect to the songs on the album.

As we think back on the "good old days," we must consider that <u>these</u> <u>days</u> will someday be the "good old days" as well. I have mentioned only a few of my Magyar-style Christmas memories. Each included simple, unrehearsed interactions with relatives, friends and acquaintances. Each person mentioned in this commentary unknowingly left a lasting impression upon my life and future. I hope you enjoyed my short trip down memory lane. <u>Boldog Karácsonyi Ünnepeket!</u>

Vilmos and I have been working on a few recipes to make your holiday parties a little more special. Thank you all for your cards and wishes; they are much appreciated. Christmas anywhere in the world is a special time. I remember the special times growing up in New Brunswick, N.J. My grandparents lived on the ground floor of our home, and my family lived on the second floor. It was like having two Christmases when you live like

that. We always had a special dinner, whether upstairs or down. The entire world seemed to stop just so we could enjoy the holiday.

It seems as if it were just yesterday. Lately, my wishes would have kept me nine years old and enjoying life with family and friends in New Brunswick. Those were the best times, and I think of the treats we enjoyed during the holidays.

No matter what happens as you age, never let go of the simple things. They serve as a constant reminder of the good life you enjoyed as a child. I always think of those treats and, yes, make them just because I am sentimental. But, more than that, it keeps a tradition alive that might otherwise die. Food in any shape--whether it be treats, soup, or a main course--lets people share good times in a comfortable environment.

While my mother and grandmother never were great candy makers, they sure could make *kifli* and other pastries. That sure did make up for candy, as I could buy that at the store.

This month Vilmos and I dug deep into our old recipe books and came up with many simple treats you can make for your family and friends for the holidays.

Without further hesitation, here's a quick holiday trivia questions before we head into the kitchen: What do Kentucky, Indiana, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Connecticut and Georgia all have in common?

#### **Almond Bark Candy**

2 cups creamy peanut butter 3 cups multi-colored mini-marshmallows 3½ cups Rice Krispies I jar dry roasted peanuts 1½ pounds White Almond Bark

To make the bark ½ cup chopped almonds 16 ounces white chocolate chips I tablespoon shortening

Line a 9x12 inch baking pan with parchment paper and then set it aside. Put chopped almonds into a skillet. Cook, stirring often over medium high heat, until golden brown, then remove from heat. Melt the white chocolate chips and shortening by placing in a stainless steel bowl over a pan of boiling water until smooth. Remove from heat and stir in half of the toasted almonds. then spread into the prepped baking pan. Sprinkle the remaining almonds over the entire pan and chill 30 minutes, or until solid. Break the bark into bite-size pieces. Melt the bark then add the peanut butter mixing well. Add remaining ingredients and smooth out on a cookie sheet. Chill, then break into pieces, put in a candy dish and serve your guests.

#### **Snow Pudding**

I package of lemon Jell-O I cup pineapple juice 3 egg whites I cup cold water

In a saucepan, bring the pineapple juice and water to a boil. Add the lemon Jell-O and stir until dissolved. Chill until the liquid turns into syrup. Beat the egg whites until very fluffy, then fold into the mixture. Pour into serving dishes and chill until the mixture is firm. Serve with custard sauce.

For the Sauce 3 whole eggs 3 egg yolks 3/4 cup granulated sugar I teaspoon flour 2½ cups whole milk 1/4 teaspoon salt I teaspoon vanilla extract

Beat the eggs and yolks with a fork until smooth and strain into a double boiler pan. Stir in the sugar and sift in the flour. Scald the milk in another saucepan and slowly stir the milk into the egg mixture. Cook over a low flame with the water



simmering not boiling. Cook until the mixture coats the back of a spoon. Remove from the heat then stir in the salt and vanilla. Cool immediately and refrigerate until ready to use.

#### **Charming Cherry Bars**

For the Crust

I cup all-purpose flour

1/4 cup powdered sugar

½ cup butter softened

For the Filling

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

3/4 cup sugar

½ teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 whole eggs

½ cup maraschino cherries, well drained

& chopped

½ cup coconut

½ cup chopped walnuts

Preheat the oven to 350°F. In a small mixing bowl, combine one cup flour and the powdered sugar. Using a fork or pastry blender, cut in the butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Press crumb mixture firmly into the bottom of an ungreased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake for 10 minutes, remove from oven and set aside. In the same bowl, combine 1/4 cup flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add the eggs and beat well. Stir in the cherries, coconut and walnuts. Spread over the partially baked crust. Return to the oven and bake an additional 25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely then cut into bars and serve.

#### **Shortbread Cookies**

½ pound butter, softened I cup confectioner's sugar I cup cornstarch

2 cups all-purpose flour

Preheat the oven to 350°F. In a mixing bowl, blend the butter and sugar until creamy, then add the cornstarch and mix well until smooth. Gradually add in the flour until the dough starts to hold its shape and is easy to roll out to ¼-inch thickness. Cut into any shapes you desire and place on a cookie sheet. Bake for 25 minutes until the cookies are a golden brown. Cool on a rack, then ice or enjoy plain.

For the Icing

I pound confectioner's sugar

3 ounces hot water

I ounces corn syrup

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Mix all the ingredients together until smooth. Place in a double boiler to heat slightly or use a microwave on low power until warm. Divide the icing and tint with food colorings, then ice your cookies.

#### Fruitcake Bars

I cup all purpose flour

1/4 cup brown sugar

½ cup butter

½ cup mixed nuts

½ cup green candied cherries

1/2 cup red candied cherries

1/2 cup maraschino cherries

I cup coconut

2 egg whites

½ cup sugar

I teaspoon vanilla extract

In a bowl, mix the flour, brown sugar and butter, then press into a  $9 \times 13$  baking pan. Bake for 10 minutes at 350°F, then remove from oven and set aside. In another bowl, mix the nuts, cherries and coconut. In a separate bowl, beat the egg whites until frothy, then add ½ cup sugar and the vanilla extract. When the egg whites start to get stiff, fold in the nut/cherry mix and pour over the base. Bake an additional 20 minutes, then cool and slice. Serve cool.

#### Rum Nut Butter Balls

2 cups all-purpose flour

1/4 cup sugar

½ teaspoon salt

I cup butter

2 teaspoons dark rum

I cup finely chopped nuts

½ cup confectioners' sugar

Preheat the oven to 325°F. In a mixing bowl, sift together the flour, sugar and salt. Cut in the butter, add the rum and chopped nuts and mix well. Shape into one-inch balls and place on a greased cookie sheet. Bake for 15 minutes or until firm but not browned. While warm, roll balls in confectioners' sugar and set aside to cool. Reroll the balls again in the powdered sugar, place on a dish and serve to your guests.

### Stop a cold in its tracks

WELCOME TO OL' MAN WINTER. I hope you all have followed my advice and have gotten your flu vaccination. And, Merry Christmas to all our members and readers. May you all receive God's blessings of the season and have joyous family celebrations.

But, watch out for little Braedon's runny nose...and Grandpa Tom's nasty cough...and Uncle Joey, who just sneezed again. OH, NO!

So, you wash your hands like a surgeon preparing for surgery and avoid the hugs and toddler kisses. But, yet there they are--a tickle in your throat, a cloudy head, an achy body. Yep, you're coming down with something.

The average adult get three colds a year, each lasting an average of nine days. But, you don't have to surrender to this bug. Here's how to stop a cold before it can take hold, and possibly feel better by tomorrow.

As soon as you feel symptoms:

• **Start drinking water or juice.** Staying hydrated cuts down on symptoms such as a sore throat or stuffy nose.

• Have some chicken soup for lunch. I know a bowl of my husband Glenn's home made chicken veggie noodle soup always makes our family feel better. Research strongly suggests that warm soup does reduce cold symptoms.

• **Gargle with salt water.** To combat a scratchy throat, add ½ teaspoon of salt to a glass of warm water. The salt will draw out the excessive fluid in your throat tissues, reduce the inflammation and clear the mucus and irritants from the back of the throat. The rinse also washes out the bacteria and viruses, which may help whether you are getting a cold or trying to prevent one.

• **Keep your nose clean.** Using a saline nasal spray as soon as symptoms appear can reduce the severity of a cold. A hot shower will help to open nasal passageways.

• **Head to the drug store.** Within the first two hours, take a pain reliever, such as acetaminophen, to fight off achiness. Over-the-counter meds, like Zyrtec and Benadryl, help with symptoms, such as runny nose and watery eyes. Allergy meds that contain a decongestant, such as Claritin D or Alavert D, will help clear your sinuses and still keep you alert. But, always check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are on any prescription medications for possible drug interactions or undesirable side effects. And, always look for generic or store brands. Compare active ingredients; they are usually identical.

• **Skip the OTC Cough medicines.** Good old honey works just as well and tastes better, too. Have one to two

tablespoons straight from the jar or in a warm cup of tea.

• Skip work if you can. Your body can fight off the virus better if you are well rested. But, if you just have to go in, steer clear of co-workers as best you can. The first few days of a cold are when you are the most contagious. To keep

from spreading your germs, wash your hands frequently with soap and water. Use an alcohol-based disinfectant gel when water is not available.

• **Shake it off.** If you are up to it, light exercise can boost the immune system. Walk around the house or do some light stretching. Just keep your heart rate below 100 bpm.

• Feed yourself. At the end of the day, a healthy meal can help fuel your immune system. Choose protein-packed foods, such as lean red meat, fish or beans, with a whole-grain side, like a brown rice, and plenty of fresh vegetables.

• **Take a hot shower before bed.** This will open up a stuffy head. Then get a good nights sleep.

The next day, do you feel the same or maybe even a little better? If so, continue this routine for a few days. If you feel worse, have a fever, start vomiting or develop a worsening headache, call your doctor. You may actually have something other than the common cold. You could have the flu or an infection that may require antibiotics or anti-viral medication.

Colds are part of the winter season...but so are Christmas shopping, decorating the house, party planning and coming together to celebrate. Don't miss out on all the season has to offer. Be on the lookout for signs of an impending bug and cut it off at the pass. Don't go down without a fight!





## Kerend china

I have yet to visit the home of any Hungarian-American that doesn't display at least one piece of Herend china, usually the most valued souvenir one brings back from any Hungarian trip. My small collection of a few little pieces pales beside the full 12-piece place settings that WPA member Maria Kovacs of Crown Point, Ind., displays and actually uses for special occasions. For years, Maria used her own money from selling baked goods to buy a piece at a time until she amassed serving dishes and display cases filled with her valuable Herend.

Herend was recently in the news because a new design was created for the wedding of Prince William and his wife, Catherine. This event marked the first time that the pattern could be seen outside of Hungary by anyone other than the royal couple, and slices of their eight-tiered wedding cake were served on plates featuring this pattern.

Other extraordinary pieces, like the rare porcelain reproduction of the crown of the former kings of Hungary, also attract attention whenever Herend is featured, as it was in August 2011 at the Hungarian embassy in Washington, D.C. There, Herend's master painter, Tamas Klein, demonstrated his skill and explained the history of the different patterns and their unique motifs. "For over 200 years," he said, "Herend pieces have appealed to those who appreciate meticulous craftsmanship and true luxury."

Klein admitted that it takes at least 10 to 15 years to become a master painter. The manufactory has its own vocational school where the most gifted candidates work in the factory. Since Klein's own family has worked in the factory for two generations, it was never a question for him of what career to choose.

Herend's name is derived from the small town of Herend, located not far from Lake Balaton. Some of my husband's own relatives have been employed there for decades, and many still speak German to one another as they meticulously paint intricate bird and flower designs daily. If the floor inspector finds any flaw, the piece is destroyed. There are no factory seconds placed in the gift shop at reduced prices.





The company was founded in 1826 with a few employees; now, there are 850 painters who work on the porcelain sets, which make the factory the second largest of its kind worldwide and the second oldest porcelain factory in the world.

Because all of its pieces are individually hand painted, Herend products are truly exceptional and valuable. When at the London World Exhibition in 1851, Queen Victoria ordered a large table service for Windsor Castle. Herend porcelain become internationally famous. The Queen Victoria pattern, with its Chinese design of flowers and butterflies, set a precedent, and soon other aristocrats followed the Queen's example. Thus, Herend prospered. In 1953, the company gained its first exposure to the American market with their medal-winning entry at the New York Exhibition of Industrial Arts.

The special hand-painted Herend dinner set made by the factory and presented to Prince William and Duchess Catherine at their wedding was a modern interpretation of the usual flower and butterfly pattern, so it was named the "Royal Garden." This pattern with its purple, green, turquoise, rose and yellow tones with golden accents on its rimmed dinner plates has elevated Herend china to become even more prized by collectors. Besides the royal couple, Franz Joseph, Queen Elizabeth II, John Paul II, Lady Diana and Benedict XVI received valuable pieces from the manufacturer.

WPA members can be rightly proud of whatever Herend they own, be they figurines, dishes, plates, entire place settings or little animal figurines like the few I own. For us all, Hungary can certainly be proud of its Herend handiwork.

My mother was an excellent homemaker and a very good cook. Her pastries were out of this world.

I have lots of nice memories of her holidays and special dinners for guests.

Sadly, she passed away at the age of 41. I often thought of what would be a fitting memorial to celebrate her life. What can you touch and admire, just like her life?

A Herend porcelain dinner set.

From thousands of motifs, these birds were playing in my dreams for 20 years before I was able to start buying. It took me 10 years to complete the 119-piece set.

This masterpiece was made in Hungary by Hungarian talent.

They also have a lifetime guarantee with replacement pieces...something almost unheard of in the porcelain industry.

The set was first created in the 1860s for the Baron de Rothschild family of Europe and is considered by many connoisseurs to be the paragon of hand painting on porcelain.

The pieces are painted in 12 different motifs, each representing a 19th Century legend about the Baroness Rothschild, who lost her pearl necklace in the garden of her Vienna residence. It was found several days later by her gardener, who saw birds playing with the necklace in a tree.
