Tibor's Take with Tibor Check, Jr.

35 years of family pride & perseverance

MY FAMILY AND I soon will celebrate an anniversary of sorts. Next month, on Mother's Day weekend to be exact, we will have been on the airwaves of FM radio for 35 years.

Spanning four generations and five decades, the "Souvenirs of Hungary" show began with little distinction or fanfare. The host of the previous Hungarian show decided to abandon ship, and a few days later our family was offered the program, but with one caveat: if we were to quit the program, the time slot would be given to another nationality group. The inaugural 60-minute broadcast began

with my grandfather Endre Cseh at the mic, my father at the control board, and Great-Grandmother Silvers, Grandmother Cseh, Aunt Gena and my mom in Studio B answering telephone calls with dedications. My *apa* recalls the first program was filled with a lot of music and a dozen or so call-in requests.

Although we were not the first group to have a Magyar radio show on WKTL-90.7 FM, we are definitely the longest lasting. Several other parties took a stab at operating the weekly program, but a varying list of reasons ended their careers as program hosts.

Our very first program was dedicated to

Hungarian mothers. We repeat this theme annually, and it remains one of our most popular programs.

I have been involved with the program since March 16, 1991. At just 75 days of age, I made my first visit to the studio facilities. The next day, I was baptized by Monsignor Dezso Torok. My *anya* recalls the weather that particular weekend was delightfully warm and sunny. "It felt like summer compared to typical mid-March weather," she said.

Coming down to do the radio show was, and is, a big thing for me. As I grew older, my duties on the show became more demanding. I loved assuming the added responsibilities. Where else could a 9-year-old kid be able to talk on the airwaves or control over 10,000 watts of electromagnetic power?

I used to tell my teachers how I talked on a radio program and manipulated a myriad of switches, buttons and levers on a studio console. At first, my teachers did not believe me and dismissed my story as the product of one

little boy's imagination. One day, my *anya* came to school to perform some volunteer work. My teacher stopped her in the hall and laughingly informed my mom how little Tibor had been telling her and his classmates about a radio program he does. My *anya* squelched any disbelief with a full explanation and provided photographs as additional proof.

A lot of things have changed over the past 35 years at WKTL and in the Mahoning and Shenango Valleys of Eastern Ohio and Western Pennsylvania. The station was upgraded several times with added broadcast power, stereo signaling and new equipment. I was honored to

be part of a few "radiothons"

to help raise money earmarked for station improvements. I saw my grandparents, Aunt Gena and many of our long time listeners pass on to Magyar Heaven.

I recall how, from May to November, there was a Hungarian event every weekend. Back then, only the cold of winter and the Lenten season limited the number of "Hungarian style" happenings.

I remember Frank Borisz calling my siblings and I "The TEA-Checks" (TEA standing for Tibor, Elizabeth and Andrew) during one of his many stops at WKTL to socialize with my gramps and dad. Mr. Borisz would often make a pit stop with his

entire *zenekar* (band) while in route to a playing engagement in Pittsburgh or destinations further east or south.

When I was 12 years of age, I was watching a Y-town TV newscast with my grandfather when the announcer talked about the 1985 Tornado of Newton Falls. I was intrigued by the videotaped accounts of this deadly storm. My *nagyapa* then detailed for me how that Friday evening twister affected the next day's radio show, a somber and sorrowful broadcast.

From show #1 to our present schedule of bi-weekly programming, my family has had one mission: to offer the American-Hungarian community an opportunity to learn of upcoming events and to share in the unique music we all love. We encourage listener participation via phone, letter or personal contact. Linked together by our Magyar heritage, we share in celebration, sorrow or remembrance.

On a few occasions, I have been asked why we don't do the program in Hungarian. My reply is twofold. First, I do



not have a full command of the Hungarian language and any attempt by me to speak exclusively in Magyar would be an injustice to our listeners. Secondly, the vast majority of our radio audience speaks English and have only a minimal understanding of Hungarian at best. We want to promote the culture, music and history of our great nationality in a vernacular that is most understood. We usually announce the songs to be played in Hungarian and mention certain key words and phrases in Magyar. The remaining segments of the program are spoken in English.

These days, I prefer to do the program by myself. As I have matured, my tastes in Magyar music have deviated from the preferences of my parents or siblings. I enjoy most the lilting melodies of Lakatos Sandor, Harmonia or Kalman Lendvay. When my brother Endre II does his program, he prefers the cimbalom style of such greats as Alex Udvary or Oskar Okros. My sister Erzsi likes the classical and operatic sounds of Liszt and Lehar. My parents prefer the continental melodies of Jeromos, Borisz, Mikisits and Rabb. I like to think our family's interest in various styles of Magyar music offers listeners to our programs a colorful aural palette.

For 35 years, this has been a labor of love, as there is no monetary compensation. We gladly advertise any and all Hungarian events and affairs. As long as the organization sponsoring the event is non-profit, the event will be announced free of charge. The gathering can be five or 500 miles away; distance is of no consequence. We want the listeners of the Souvenirs of Hungary Radio Program to know there are other American-Hungarians out there doing things to keep our heritage alive.

If you are driving through the Youngstown, Ohio, area on any given Saturday between noon and 1:30 p.m., tune into WKTL-90.7 FM. For a special dedication or song, phone in during show hours at 1-330-755-8578.

Just as with each of my *Takes*, I always conclude the radio show with three final words:

Éljen a Magyar! **Tibor II**

Point to Ponder....

WPA National President George S. Charles Jr. composed an inspiring and insightful "State of the Association" commentary which was published in the February 2014 issue of William Penn Life. He stressed that our beloved fraternal organization is now more than ever committed to supporting, perpetuating and living the "American-Hungarian way of life."

Frankly, I am amazed at how WPA does what it does with the funds they have available. When considering the many and various events that WPA sponsors throughout the year, it is mind boggling how they do it.

WPA is extremely efficient at money management. If you need proof of that, just read the actuary's report for 2013 that appears elsewhere in this issue. As members we get a HUGE "bang for the buck." These fraternal benefits are generally overlooked by the membership. Take for example this magazine, the branch Christmas parties and the annual WPA Picnic-A Great Fraternal Fest. Each are huge endeavors and are successful due to an enormous amount of planning, dedication, compromise and volunteerism.

WPA annually sponsors or supports dozens of American-Hungarian events. Most of these events are conducted by churches, groups and organizations not affiliated with William Penn. By and large, the proceeds generated by these events benefit the group hosting it. (Most of these organizations are considered non-profit.) Many times these organizations have members that are also part of WPA, thus they benefit in two ways.

I have attended the WPA Picnic for the past six years. Many others attending the picnic are not members of WPA, but they are beneficiaries of this event. I have attended golf outings, dances and concerts that were sponsored in part by WPA. Many times those attending these events had never even heard of William Penn. Yet, they were enjoying the event due, in part, to the generosity of WPA.

By law, function and purpose, every fraternal insurance association such as ours has one primary task. That main purpose is to be able to financially back the thousands of life insurance policies and annuities owned by the membership. I do not profess to be in any way, shape or form an insurance/annuity expert, but I am casually aware of how a budget works. Just like your own household, WPA must have a financial plan comprised of short, medium and long term goals. Without a purposeful financial strategy, William Penn would be like a ship without a rudder eventually succumbing to dire circumstances.

WPA's leadership has had the daunting task of navigating our fraternal ship through an oftentimes turbulent sea of financial uncertainty. To their credit, they have steered our ship safely for 128 years while many other Hungarian-based fraternal societies have foundered.

The WPA reflects the financial demographics of the clients it represents. William Penn is strong because of the families and individuals that make up the Association. Since 1886, each subsequent generation of WPA members has seen an improvement in their overall financial security by following an ethic of hard work, education and frugality. Jó étvágyat vegetables!

FÁRADJON BE A MAGYAR KONYHÁBA!

Providing mutual aid for the benefit of all concerned is a good way to define "fraternalism." When one person needs help, all others act accordingly to aid the person or persons with the

problem. Fraternalism is a lifestyle, not just a choice.

It has always been the purpose of The Hungarian Kitchen to share Magyar culinary values by means of fraternalism. The more you share, the better for all concerned. Keeping that in mind, Chef Vilmos has decided being semi-retired and helping Chef Béla is better than working alone in the kitchen. The HK is back to share more with you, its faithful readers. My new position at the Community College of Philadelphia has been challenging but very rewarding thus far. It provides an opportunity to experiment with recipes and share more by way of this column and videos of culinary techniques, which will be available in the near future for your viewing pleasure. As we move forward, I plan to continue with monthly trivia and other

sidebars containing information about Magyar cuisine and food in general.

So, let's get started with a bit of trivia: What are the two most popular vegetables consumed in the

world? As always, the answer waits at the end.

The Hungarian Kitchen will spend the next four months exploring the current trend toward healthier eating. This month, we'll look at vegetables and all the benefits they offer. Next month, we will follow up with a column on grains and all the benefits they contribute to our good health. So, here we go once again into the kitchen....

The definition of a vegetable is "an edible plant or part thereof which may be consumed raw or prepared by cooking using various cooking techniques." It should be noted that vegetables are classified as part of the plant kingdom. The other types of plant foods are fruits, nuts and grains.

We can break down further the classification of vegetables as they compare to fruit:

• Fruit (Botanical): the ovary of a flowering plant.

• Fruit (Culinary): any edible part of a plant with a sweet flavor.

Vegetable (Culinary): any edible part of a plant with a savory, not sweet, flavor.

• Vegetable (Common Terms): commodities that are taxed as vegetables in a particular jurisdiction.

Vegetables contain little, if any, fat and a minimal amount of protein. They contain high amounts of vitamins such as K, A, and B6, along with minerals and carbohydrates. All in all, they are a very healthy source of nutrition for the body.

Studies show that diets high in vegetables and grains are heart-healthy. Many worldwide cuisines put the focus on vegetables, then carbohydrates and lastly meat products as a source of protein.

There are many different types of vegetables, including:

- 1) **Cabbages**: bok choy, broccoli, broccoli rabe, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, red head cabbage, green head cabbage, savoy cabbage, kale, kohlrabi, Napa cabbage.
- 2) Fruit-Vegetables: avocados, eggplants, sweet peppers, hot peppers, tomatillos, tomatoes.

3) Gourds: cucumbers, chayotes.


- Winter Variety Squashes: acorn, butternut, buttercup, Hubbard, pumpkin, spaghetti, turban, calabata.
- Summer Variety Squashes: pattypan, crookneck yellow, zucchini.
- 4) Greens: collards, mustard, sorrel, spinach, Swiss chard, turnip tops.

5) Mushrooms:


- Common Types: crimini, portabella, shiitake, straw, enoki, cloud ear, white button, porcini.
- *Truffles*: white truffles (Piedmontese) black truffles (Perigord).

6) Onions:

 Bulb Style: Bermuda white, Spanish yellow, red purple, Vidalia, Walla Walla, maui, Texas sweet, white pearl.







7) Pods & Seeds:

- Corn: sweet, white, yellow.
- Legumes: green beans, string beans, runner beans, snap beans, wax beans, haricot vert.
- Dried: black eyed peas, lentils, kidney, navy, pinto, chickpeas, split green peas.
- Fresh: soybeans, snow peas, peas shoots, fresh peas, okra, edamame.

8) Roots & Tubers:

- Taproots: beets, carrots, celery root, Jerusalem artichokes, jicama, parsnips, radishes, rutabagas, turnips, water chestnuts.
- Stalks: asparagus, bamboo shoots, celery, fennel, hearts of palm, nopales.

As you can see, there are many varieties and types of vegetables to choose, whether you're snacking or looking to complete a meal for your family. Fresh carrots and sliced cucumbers make for a quick snack in between meals. In the summer, you can enjoy a garden-fresh tomato, sliced with a sprinkle of granulated garlic (not salt) to savor the flavor. Let us not forget stalk veggies, like asparagus or celery, as an appetizer.

Vegetables can be prepared using simple culinary techniques. While you can boil vegetables, try steaming to keep more nutritional value in the vegetable. When you boil vegetables, such as carrots or potatoes, a lot of the flavor will transfer into the water. Next time you boil a vegetable, taste the water before you add the vegetables then taste it after your vegetables are cooked, and you will note a flavor difference. By steaming, fewer flavors are extracted from the vegetable which means a better tasting product for mealtime.

Frying vegetables, like potatoes or onion rings, enhances the flavor and gives crispness attributing to the kinesthetic experience when we taste those foods.

There are those vegetables which can be baked or roasted to bring out additional flavor. Beets peeled then roasted are an excellent source of iron. The earthy flavor is different than boiling or steaming that tuber. Many types of squash, usually of the winter variety, take on a different flavor profile when baked or roasted in the oven.

And, finally, you can grill vegetables in season to enhance your barbecue or cookout. Shish Kebabs with chunks of corn, onions, and peppers go great with any meat, fish or poultry.

Vegetables are available year round. Since they are grown both outdoors and in controlled environments such as greenhouses, there is always a plethora to select from and enjoy.

One last thing to consider when selecting any vegetables: if you cannot get fresh, get frozen. Commercially canned or home canning, while convenient, does not maintain as much nutritional value as fresh or frozen products.

Enjoy the recipes, and eat your vegetables!



Trivia Answer: Potatoes and carrots are the two most popular vegetables in the world. Food archaeology traces potatoes and carrots back to the Third Century. The potato has roots originating in South America. They are available in many colors, not just earthy brown or white. The original carrots were white in color and turned orange when cross bred with wild and cultivated varieties. The third most popular vegetable? Broccoli.

RECIPES

Spicy Pan Vegetables

- ½ pound asparagus, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 4 ounces broccoli florets
- 1/2 head Savoy cabbage, finely shredded
- I leek, finely shredded
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- I tablespoon canola oil
- I-inch piece fresh ginger, peeled & finely minced
- 2 teaspoons coriander seed, lightly toasted, then crushed
- I teaspoon yellow mustard seed
- 2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped

Kosher salt, to taste

Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

In a saucepan of water, simmer the asparagus and broccoli until tender. Heat the butter and oil in a large frying pan. Add the ginger, coriander and mustard seed, frying for one minute. Add the leeks and cabbage; stir fry for two minutes. Add the drained broccoli and asparagus; continue to stir fry for another three minutes. Season the vegetables with salt and pepper, garnish with parsley, then serve hot to your guests.

Hungarian Glazed Carrots

- 2 pounds carrots, peeled & sliced into coins 1/4" thick
- 1/2 stick unsalted butter
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons Hungarian paprika

Put the carrots in a saucepan and cover with water. Simmer until they are al dente, then drain well. Add the butter and brown sugar, then simmer until the carrots are coated and shiny in appearance. Garnish with paprika for extra flavor before serving to your guests.

Napa Cabbage Noodle Salad

- 2 packages Ramen noodles
- 1/2 cup sesame seeds
- 3 ounces sliced almonds
- ½ cup unsalted butter
- I large head Napa or Chinese cabbage
- 5 green onions with tops
- I cup sugar
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- I cup canola oil
- I tablespoon soy sauce

In a skillet, brown the noodles with sesame seeds, almonds and butter but do not add seasoning packets. Set mixture aside to cool. Chop the cabbage and green onions and reserve. In a saucepan, combine the sugar, vinegar, oil and soy sauce cooking until sugar dissolves. Cool the dressing for 30 minutes in refrigerator. In a salad bowl, combine the cabbage, onions, noodle mixture and the dressing. Toss, coating all ingredients. Garnish with sesame seeds and serve to your guests.

Butternut Squash & Apple Casserole

- 3 pounds butternut squash
- 2 Gala apples, cored, peeled & diced
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1/4 cup cold butter, unsalted
- I tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- Salt & white pepper, to taste

Peel the squash, remove seeds, and cut into 3/4-inch cubes. Place squash and apples in a baking dish, adding two tablespoons of water. Blend remaining ingredients together into a crumbly mix. Sprinkle over the squash/apples, then cover dish with foil. Bake at 350°F for 45 minutes. Garnish with additional cinnamon and serve hot to your guests.

Broccoli & Rice Casserole

1/4 cup unsalted butter I pound broccoli florets, quartered ½ cup chopped Vidalia onion 11/2 cups long grain rice I can Campbell's cream of chicken soup I cup grated cheddar cheese

Cook the rice in three cups of water until done, then drain and set aside. Blanche the broccoli florets until al dente, then drain and set aside. In a skillet, melt the butter, then sauté the onions. Add the soup and cook for two minutes. Add the rice, broccoli and cheese, stirring well. Pour mixture into a 9 x 13 buttered casserole dish and bake for 15 minutes at 350°F. Garnish with a sprinkle of paprika, then serve hot to your guests.

Ron's Lecso

- 3 pounds Beefsteak tomatoes
- 6 medium green peppers
- 8 sweet banana peppers
- 6 medium yellow onions
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- I tablespoon sugar

Core the tomatoes and cut into quarters. Slice the green peppers in half, remove the seeds and white core, and then cut into I-inch chunks. Slice the banana peppers in half lengthwise, then remove the seeds and white core. Cut each half again lengthwise, then cut all four pieces in half, giving you eight total pieces from each yellow pepper. Slice the ends off each onion and remove outer skin, then cut in half from top to bottom, placing flat side down and cutting into 1/4-inch pieces. Put tomatoes in a large saucepan with a cover and simmer for 25 minutes until they liquefy. Stir constantly so tomatoes do not burn and stick to the bottom of pan. When tomatoes are almost done. stir in the salt, pepper and sugar. If there is not enough liquid after tomatoes are cooked, add a 12 ounce can of tomato juice. Add all the peppers and onions, stirring well. Bring mixture back to a boil, then turn off the heat and let set with cover on the pot for one hour. Lecso may be canned or stored in an air-tight container for up to seven days in the refrigerator.

Crudité Dip

- I pint sour cream
- 2 tablespoons onion powder
- I stalk celery, diced small
- I medium carrot, peeled & diced small
- 1/2 red pepper, diced small
- 1/2 yellow pepper, diced small
- Salt & white pepper, to taste

In a mixing bowl, combine all of the above ingredients; blend well. Taste and adjust seasonings to your preference. Chill and serve with vegetable crudités platter or with crackers as a spread.

My Cifraszűr by Kathy Megyeri

ON MY LAST TRIP to Hungary two years ago, I discovered the most amazing place, Central Market Hall in downtown Budapest. The entire first floor holds locally grown produce, meat, fish, poultry and gifts. However, the second floor is a treasure of crafts, needlework, clothing, Herend china and embroidered linens. In one booth, Iluska Bt., a superior sales clerk, Makkai Attilla-né, showed me a Hungarian tuxedo made of superb black wool expressly for females. I have worn mine often and value the intricate braid work on the bodice.

But, the real find was the *szűr*, an outstanding example of the cut felt appliqué technique used in Hungary. I learned that a szűr is a woolen cloak worn by nomadic shepherds in the extreme climate of the Hungarian plains, usually by horsemen from Hortobágy. Simple and utilitarian, the szűr functions as a saddle blanket, bedroll and even as a means of storing food when the sleeves are sewn closed. By the early 20th century, the szűr became a lavish,

richly colored symbol of prosperous countrymen. When a suitor left his szűr behind at his beloved's house after proposing, he'd know whether her family had accepted or rejected him by whether the cloak remained inside the home or was thrown out onto the street.

The designs within the intricate cut work were derived from nature, but were originally flowers. Until the early 19th century, large areas were not embroidered. Then, flowers and woodland motifs were traced into patterns, as they are now. The appliqué is stitched and then painstakingly cut away to reveal roses, flower buds, tulips, carnations and rosemary, as well as cherries, wolf's teeth and snails. Each flower has a tiny hole cut for little "seeds," symbolizing the mysteries of life's beginnings.

Within Hungarian cooperatives, artisans have handed down their skills from master to apprentice and from mother to daughter. A company called Lánya--which in Hungarian means "daughter"--is located in Sheffield, Vermont, and makes a szűr in wool melton that is lined with microfleece and trimmed in hand-cut felts. Owner Gay Ellis makes hats, gloves, purses and coats in colors that range from garnet to black to cream.

My szűr, a full-length coat, is a work of art in black and red. When I wear it, admirers want to know its history and place of origin. But, it is a heavy garment and can only be worn during the few short months of winter where I live.

The cost of such garments depends on the amount and intricacy of the cut felt work. Right now, I'm saving my money for the short version of my szűr that would allow me more mobility and is lighter in weight, allowing me to wear it in more moderate weather.

I so treasure the craftsmanship and history of my cifraszűr that I'm considering hanging it as a piece of wall art when I'm not wearing it. It's the best souvenir I have ever brought back from Hungary. □

Over four generations, my family has advanced from being steel workers, house cleaners, custodians and boiler operators to the current generation which is made up of accomplished educators, architects, doctors, medical administrators and a soon to be international lawyer.

I trust that the same prudent decision making will continue, just as it has since 1886.

Actuary's Report for 2013

Emphasis on safety

WPA members should feel very proud of the Association and its financial strength to guarantee their benefits

William Penn Association continues its long history of outstanding service to members while maintaining an increasingly strong margin of safety to members. Certain highlights from the financial reports to the regulatory authorities and the actuarial report to the officers and directors should be summarized for the benefit of the members. All numbers herein are taken from the official reports as filed. References are rounded for convenience.

Emphasis in 2013 was, again, on controlled growth and development. The program was eminently successful. Assets increased by 12 percent while premium income remained strong at over \$39,000,000. At the same time, profits increased to \$2,340,000 before dividends. This increase is attributable to careful management of investments, favorable persistency and favorable mortality expenses.

The year 2013 continued the Association's long history of returning to the members the highest possible benefits consistent with safety. The major lines of business were again profitable. This is a fine record. The members should feel very proud of WPA and its financial strength to guarantee their benefits. WPA continues its emphasis on safety to members.

The strong financial position of WPA should be emphasized. No WPA member suffered any loss in benefit value or reduction in dividends nor experienced a rate increase because of market fluctuations. By contrast, many persons insured in commercial companies, under variable indexed or market value adjustment contracts, experienced a loss in policy value of 30 to 50 percent. Many Universal Life plans imposed rate increases. WPA continues to be a very safe, secure place to hold money for future delivery.

Assets at over \$327,000,000 continue to be valued very conservatively, are of exceptionally high qual-

ity and fully comply with the strict standards of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. All members can continue to have confidence that the assets standing behind their policies are sound and will provide the required funds when needed.

The safety margin at Dec. 31, 2013, continued at the very high level of 109.4 percent. This means that the Association held over \$109 of admissible assets behind each \$100 of liabilities as a safeguard and guarantee to all members that the benefits promised in the certificates will be paid when due. The Association enjoys a stronger safety margin than most of the very large companies. This strong safety margin will continue for the benefit of all members, even into the next generation.

The Association enjoyed a very favorable year from investments. The net rate of return on mean assets was 5.76 percent, which supports the generous rates paid to members. During 2013, the Association earned net investment income of \$17,350,000 after deducting all investment expenses. Investment income exceeded requirements by \$7,614,000 in 2013. Excess interest continued to be the most important profit source to the Association.

In addition to the excellent investment returns, it is worth noting that the Association increased its Security Valuation Reserves, to guard against adverse fluctuation in investments, to \$4,470,000. The members' assets are well protected by this strong safety fund.

The Association has set aside \$295,645,000 of life, annuity and A&H reserves, deposits and claims for future payments to members. Management continues its prudent and conservative practice of setting aside sufficient funds with which to meet all known and contingent liabilities. WPA is doing an outstanding job of managing the members' funds.

An important index of service to members is the total amount paid to members. During 2013, the Association paid the significant amount of \$20,146,000. A summary of these payments to members for the past two years is as follows:

WPA continues to render a truly valuable financial service to members.

In our opinion, the amounts carried in the balance sheets on account of the various actuarial items:

- are computed in accordance with commonly accepted actuarial standards consistently applied and are fairly stated in accordance with sound actuarial principles;
- (2) are based on actuarial assumptions which produce reserves at least as great as those called for in any contract provision as to reserve basis and method, and are in accordance with all other contract provisions;
- (3) meet the requirements of the insurance laws and regulations of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and are at least as great as the minimum aggregate amounts required by the state in which this statement is filed;
- (4) are computed on the basis of assumptions consistent with those used in computing the corresponding items in the annual statement of the preceding year end with any exceptions as noted below; and
- (5) include provision for all actuarial reserves and related statement items which ought to be established.

It is apparent that the officers and directors continue the skillful management of the members' money while maintaining very strong safeguards.



ome and join us for a weekend of fun for the entire family when WPA hosts our 31st Annual Golf Tournament & Scholarship Days, July 18 and 19. This year, our tournament returns to the Quicksilver Golf Club in Midway, Pa. This magnificent course has played host to not only four previous WPA tournaments but also a number of tournaments sponsored by the Senior PGA Tour and the Nationwide Tour. Golf Digest has awarded it a 4-star rating. Golf Week Magazine calls it one of the top 15 courses in Pennsylvania and the best public course in the state.

While the adults enjoy this championship course, our younger members and guests are invited to join us for the Mini-Golf Open. All WPA members ages 6 to 15 are welcome to play a FREE round of miniature golf at Scally's Golf Center in Coraopolis, Pa., on Saturday, July 19, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Non-members can play for \$5 per child. There will also be special prizes awarded. (Mini-Golf Open registration form appears on page 19.)

The weekend's festivities begin Friday, July 18, with the annual Friday night golfers' reception at the Pittsburgh Airport Marriott. The reception is free to golfers and their family members. Non-golfing guests can attend the reception for \$12. Those planning to attend MUST pre-register for the reception (see form opposite page). The evening will feature food, refreshments, the ever-popular Chinese auction, a Mini-Monte Carlo Night for adults and caricature drawings for children.

Our 18-hole tournament will begin the next morning with a shotgun start at 8:30 a.m. Play will be a straight scramble. Along the course, golfers will have the chance to win prizes as part of our traditional skill shot contests, including longest drive, longest putt, closest to the pin and closest to the line. All golfers will also enjoy the use of GPS-equipped carts, and a hot dog and beverage at the turn.

Our weekend's official activities will conclude with the annual golf barbeque to be held at the Quicksilver Golf Club immediately following the tournament.

Accommodations will be at the Pittsburgh Airport Marriott. Room rates are \$105 per night based on double occupancy. All rooms will be reserved on a first-come/first-served basis and are subject to availability. All golfers and guests must make their room reservations directly with the hotel by calling toll-free I-800-328-9297. To receive our special room rate, use group code WNO for phone reservations and group code WNOWNOA for online reservations. Hotel reservations must be made by June 20 to get the WPA rate.

The tournament entry fee is \$112 for WPA members and \$122 for non-members. This fee includes green fees, bag service, locker room service, GPS-equipped golf carts, a sandwich and beverage at the turn AND admission to the golf barbeque. Tickets for the barbeque are \$42 for WPA adult members age 16 and older, \$52 for adult non-members, \$12 for teens ages 12 to 15, and free for children ages 11 and under.

An "Early Bird" discount will be offered to all golfers and non-golfing barbeque guests. Golfers and non-golfing barbeque guests can save \$10 off either their golf entry fee or their barbeque admission if they mail and postmark their entries and reservations by June 10, 2014

Once again, the tournament will feature the fun and exciting hole-in-one contests. All eligible members who score a hole-in-one at the designated par-3 hole during tournament play will win a \$15,000 cash prize. Any non-member who scores an ace on the designated hole will win \$7,500. Plus, cash prizes will be awarded to golfers who score a hole-in-one on any of Quicksilver's other par-3 holes during tournament play. On those holes, eligible WPA members will win \$5,000, while non-members can take home \$2,500.

If a hole-in-one is not scored on the \$15,000 hole, a special \$500 cash prize will be awarded to the eligible member who gets his or her tee shot closest to the pin on that hole. By "eligible member" we mean a golfer who is an adult life benefit member of William Penn Association by June 24, 2014, with at least one year's premiums paid.

RESERVATIONS are now being accepted for the 2014 WPA tour of Hungary which will focus entirely inside the present day borders of Hungary. The WPA tour will depart from Pittsburgh on Saturday, Sept. 13, and include 13 days and 12 nights in and around Budapest and other towns inside of Hungary.

Here is an overview of the itinerary:

- Visit Budapest's shopping district near Váci Street and Vörösmarty Square.
- Dinner on a Danube River boat cruise.
- Free time to explore Budapest.
- Visit Esztergom's Basilica with wine tasting in its Primas wine cellar.
- Renaissance Knights tournament in Visegrad.
- Boat trip on Lake Balaton, visit Balatonfüred and Tihany, Bory Castle in Székesfehérvár, peasant wedding party in Lovas Csárda.
- Visit Veszprém and the Herend Porcelain factory, attend the Reformed Age Days Festival that has a 19th Century theme, cross the Danube, view a live horse show in Varga Tanya.
- Visit Kecskemét and its City Hall.

• Travel to northeastern Hungary to visit the Tokaj Wine growing region.

 Travel to Nyíreygháza and Máriapócs, pálinka distillery and farewell dinner in hotel.

We will stay in beautiful hotels, travel in an air-conditioned bus and have an English-speaking guide. Breakfast daily and one other meal daily is included in the land tour price. Some mornings are free for optional sightseeing tours and shopping for folk art.



Eligibility Rules for Year 2014 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing for four (4) years.
- b) For both new and renewal applicants, the students must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2014 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a life benefit member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2014.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
 - d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period.
 - e) New applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.williampennassociation.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. A copy of the student's SAT/ACT scores or waiver letter from the school in which enrolled.
- 5. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3, 4 and 5 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- f) **Renewal applicants** must submit the following:
 - I. A letter requesting a renewal grant.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the questions: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Renewal Letter and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- g) All applications, renewal letters and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed submissions will NOT be accepted.**
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.
- k) All applications, renewal letters and essays must be mailed and postmarked by **Saturday, May 31, 2014**. Any applications, renewal letters and essays postmarked after that date will not be considered.

My favorite Easter basket

As a young girl growing up in an American-Hungarian home, I always thought Easter was a special time of year.

For most children, the holiday's big moment is finding and enjoying the sweet chocolates of an Easter basket. But, my favorite Easter basket is not the one filled with candy; it's the Blessing Basket. There are many reasons why this version of the Easter basket will always be the most important basket to me.

This oval-shaped basket carries many happy memories and a long history of family traditions. This basket once belonged to my great-grandmother. Because of its age, it comes out of storage just once a year. The basket's faded cover came from Csót, Hungary, many decades ago. The foods with which we fill it are mostly made by my mother and me. Best of all, I have the responsibility of carrying the basket to church for the blessing.

Once in church, I get to choose where the basket is placed. Sometimes there are so many baskets that the priest requests we place them along the communion rail. Of course, the hardest part is waiting to enjoy the savory treats hidden under the cover. We are never allowed to even touch the food until our return home from Easter Sunday Mass.

Over the years I have held conversations with many Hungarians concerning what they place in their Blessing Baskets. I have learned that some churches bless baskets on Holy Saturday, while others do so on Easter Sunday prior to, during or after Mass. Some families consume their food right after the blessing, while others wait until lunch or suppertime on Easter Sunday. Some families place in their baskets nonfood items, such as photographs of recently departed loved ones or brayer books.


