## Resolve to be prepared

Proper planning will make things easier for your loved ones

HAPPY NEW YEAR and welcome 2017!

This is the time of year for resolutions. According to Nielsen surveys, the most popular New Year's resolutions are to get in better physical shape and lose weight. But, most such resolutions are short-lived, and people typically revert to old habits within one month. The third most popular resolution is the easiest to maintain: to not make resolutions at all.

You have to go pretty far down the list of resolutions before coming across ones that involve getting in better *financial* shape or taking some time to properly plan for your and your loved ones' financial future.

In 2016, we all lost friends, relatives and loved ones. Recently, one of my associates attended the funeral of a close friend, and she told me how shocked the family was at the total cost of the funeral. She recommended I write a column regarding the preparation and costs associated with your average funeral.

So, in the spirit of helping our members "resolve" to make better plans in the coming year, I'd like to share some interesting data with you.

Many times you'll hear people say that the average funeral costs around \$6,000. That estimate, however, is typically based on old figures. Basic funerals today typically cost anywhere between \$8,000 and \$12,000 and like everything else, the costs go up annually due to inflation. While cremation is gaining in popularity, the traditional funeral is still the most popular choice.

I lost my mother-in-law last year. Her instructions included a request for a simple cremation rather than a traditional funeral. She was very proud of the fact that she had purchased a "pre-paid" plan and always told us that "everything was taken care of." After she passed away, the funeral director told us her plan was valid only at that particular funeral home, which was in Florida where she had resided for many years. She purchased the plan there before returning home to New York to live out her last years with family. After tallying all the fees and other costs related to the funeral, our expenses exceeded \$7,000 - not including the cost of hotel rooms and meals while the family was there. We did, however, (after a lot of screaming and yelling) receive a small refund of the premiums she pre-paid to the funeral home in Florida. That was one great learning experience for us all.

While it's important to realize that costs can vary considerably between funeral homes and geographical areas of the country, here's a ballpark estimate of the main costs associated with a funeral today:

- Funeral director's services \$1,500
- Casket \$2,300
- Embalming \$500
- Funeral home services (viewing) \$500 to \$1,500

- Grave site \$1,000 to \$2,000
- Grave site services \$600

In this example, total costs would be between \$8,400 and \$10,900, and that's just for the main items. There are additional charges for things like flowers, clergy, musicians, a post-funeral reception or dinner, and placing an obituary in the local newspaper. There are also costs that many don't anticipate, such as travel, meals and (possibly) hotel rooms for out-of-town family and guests.

Speaking again from personal experience, I lost my mother four years ago. She passed away in Florida but wanted to be buried in the Pittsburgh area. Our entire family flew to Florida to be with her when she passed; then we held services in Florida before having her transported back to Pittsburgh, where we again held services and the actual funeral. Although this isn't the norm, that experience is not uncommon and certainly illustrates how additional expenses can be incurred when your family is spread out like ours was.

Here at William Penn Association, we are often asked

if we have a type of certificate that is commonly referred to as a "final expense" or "burial" policy that will provide additional assets to help offset the cost of the funeral, or final expenses. While "final expense" type policies come in various shapes and sizes, one thing they all have in common is that they are actually *life insurance* policies.

Some companies issue final expense policies in which the insured must survive for a period of two years before receiving the full benefit. These are typically called "graded benefit" policies, in that the benefit is "graded" upwards to the full value, typically after a two-year period. These types of plans offer a reduced benefit during the first two years, but I have seen some that offer nothing more than a refund of premiums should the insured die before the expiration of the two-year period.

If you or a loved one find yourself searching for this type of policy, I'd first consider a plan that is "fully underwritten," or is a true "guaranteed issue" contract, that pays 100 percent of the death benefit from day one.

One of WPA's most popular choices for a "final expense" type of coverage is known as our Ordinary Life **Senior Special**. This plan was designed for seniors that are in generally good health, with standard risks accepted through Table 4. This means that you don't need to be 100 percent healthy, and we consider applicants who may have diabetes, high blood pressure, build issues or many other ailments that could cause you to be less than a standard risk. Please see the chart on the previous page to see how much coverage you may qualify to receive whether paying \$200 or \$400 per year. It's also important to realize that smokers and non-smokers pay the same rates under this program. You can also pay your premiums monthly, quarterly or twice a year.

Your WPA agent or broker can help you determine if this type of policy fits your needs, and can help determine if you qualify based on a few simple questions. Don't have an agent or broker currently assigned to your account? ### Tibor's Take with Tibor Check, Jr.

## The 25th year gift

JANUARY IS A COLD and snowy month for many of us. For those living north of the Mason-Dixon Line, the season can be a longer struggle. Living in DC, a citizen has to deal with lesser amounts of snow and prolonged cold temperatures compared to WPA members in the snow belt of the Great Lakes. Each winter season, the DC area gets four or five snow accumulations that merit shoveling or plowing. The temps generally hover 10 degrees above or below the freezing point. But sometimes, a cold, rainy day of 40 degrees can feel more frigid than a dry 20-degree day.

I learned early on that a nice glass of Tokaji Aszú offers a respite from winter's chill. I became familiar with this particular wine when the adults would enjoy a bottle or two at holiday celebrations at my nagyapa's. Their Tokaji preference was for either 4, 5 or 6 puttonyos. For those of you who may not know, Tokaji Aszú is one of the most celebrated sweet wines in the world. *Puttony* is a Hungarian term for a grape harvesting basket, which indicated the number of baskets of Aszú grapes used to make a particular barrel of wine. The term has come to indicate the level of sweetness in the wine, with 3 being the least sweet and 6 being very sweet. There are two categories above 6. Aszú Esszencia, which is sweeter yet, and the Holy Grail of all Tokaji, the *Esszencia*, made entirely from Aszú grapes.

Recently, I joined a wine tasting group that meets informally at either an upscale beverage shoppe or at the home of one of the participants. Each of us is responsible for bringing a bottle for sampling. There usually is a theme, and I try to bring something that comes from Hungary.

For Christmas, Monika and I decided to invite the group to our townhome, and since we were the hosts, it was our prerogative to name the theme. I originally was going to have a Hungarian wine night but realized my wine-loving counterparts would have a difficult time finding a bottle from *Magyarország*, since I've learned that Hungarians greedily keep most of their *bor* (*wine*) for themselves.

So, we decided to host a "dessert wine night." Our guests brought German, French and American varieties. There was sherry, sauternes, riesling, beerenauslese, ice wine and, of course, our Tokaji Aszú #6. We provided a variety of foods for pairing, such as Pick Salami, dobos torte, pogácsa, fresh pears and apples, chocolate and cheese.

As the night progressed, we shared our tasting notes, and one member asked me where I acquired the Tokaji and what it cost (\$65). He was puzzled as to why the Aszú would be twice the price as the Niagara Ice Wine he had provided, especially since both are harvested in sub-freezing temperatures.

Essentially, ice wine comes from grapes that have sat on the vine and are only picked when the temperature has stayed below freezing for several days. Once harvested, the juice from the grapes is extracted by huge wine presses.

In comparison, Aszú is the result of fungus that invades the skin of the fruit causing the water inside to escape while the sugar remains. This natural occurring process is called "botrytis" or "noble rot" and is one of the most labor-intensive methods of winemaking. The amount of noble rot rendered each year is dependent upon many factors that are controlled by Mother Nature. Each individual grape is selected and hand picked. Oftentimes, only a few botrytised grapes are collected from an entire bunch.

The process only gets more complicated from that point on. I could write several more pages about the

Hungarian television commercials are much different compared to those we see in the States. Over the years, the Zwack-Unicum family of distilleries has produced some iconic spots offering an eclectic repertoire of messages that essentially sell ideas and not their products. The ads have addressed a full spectrum of subjects: some have been funny while others have been sad, sentimental or even patriotic. Many of these messages have been archived for viewing via YouTube.

For the 2016 Christmas season, a special family-oriented commercial aired and found immediate international popularity. When watching it for the first time, you will not know it is a Zwack production until the very end as there are no spoken words, just pleasant background music. I suggest a Google search to watch this fantastic message of multiple generations sharing a special Christmas moment. Scroll down the list of various websites until the YouTube address is found, as there are many European sites offering web-surfers the same commercial, but the download time is much longer. - *Tibor* 



## "Wine of Kings, The King of Wines," but the purpose of this *Take* is not intended to present the readers with technical aspects of Tokaji production.

Once I completed my explanation of noble rot, guests said they were impressed by my vast knowledge concerning Tokaji. I stressed that my expertise was small in comparison to what my mother and father know about the wine. As the question and answer session continued, another participant asked how it became my parents' drink of choice? "As good American-Hungarians," I explained, "we feel it is our duty to know as much as we can about the culture."

Although that answer satisfied my guests, the truth is I wanted a more satisfactory answer for myself. So, the next day I contacted my parents and asked them how Tokaji Aszú became their favorite wine? Surprisingly, their reply was not a straightforward one.

Before my grandfather shared Aszú as a special occasion treat, my father's love for the delectable liquid formed when he served as an altar boy. At that time, altar boys were assigned the duty of disposing of any wine left over in the cruets once Mass was completed. Being a responsible server, my father, along with a fellow altar boy, would volunteer to conduct the task and did so not by dumping the leftover wine down the drain but rather by drinking it. The wine they "disposed of" was a sweet wine which the Hungarian pastor once mentioned was like a Hungarian wine called Tokaji Aszú.

#### Tibor's Take

In several of my recent *Takes*, I have been sharing stories about the many items that have been stored away in my parents' basement. One such discovery felt as if I had found a previously hidden chamber in an ancient pyramid. My siblings and I were given several bottles of Tokaji that until this time had been squirreled away in a remote corner of the cellar.

Recently, it came to light that, for several decades, my parents have been sporadically obtaining wines that are predominately Hungarian and mostly Tokaji Aszú. I learned that my dad began collecting wine in the early 1970s. His first bottle of Aszú was given to him by his Aunt Gena after returning from a WPA tour. That inaugural bottle is still in his possession as are dozens of other vintages obtained for occasion-specific reasons (birthdays, anniversarys and graduations).

My siblings and I each were given four bottles with my parents informing us that many more bottles were being held in reserve. Who knows what secret varieties lay hidden yet in the warrens of my parents' cellar? I learned that if stored properly, Tokaji Azsú can last for centuries and improves with aging. Tokaji is a perfect time capsule-type gift as it can be passed down generation to generation.

For my 25th birthday, my parents presented me with a bottle of 1991 Puttonyos #6 Aszú (I was born exactly a 12:00:03 a.m. on Jan. 1, 1991) and was told to open it on a special occasion. I served that bottle to my wine tasting group. My mom and dad were less than overjoyed about my decision to do so—though I suspect that they had secretly wanted me to serve it the next time they came down for a visit.

I have learned my lesson and have stowed away a few bottles in my cellar--the apple does not fall far from the tree, I guess.

Stay warm everyone, and see you in February!

## William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.

### Eligibility Rules for Year 2017 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing for four (4) years as of January 1, 2017.
- b) For both new and renewal applicants, the students must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2017 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a life benefit member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2017.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
  - d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period.
  - e) New applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.wpalife.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "With all of the societal problems we face today, where do you see goodness in the world?" If the essay exeeds 100 words, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Wednesday, May 31, 2017. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2017 school term.

## How to make a mitten wreath

Here's something warm and friendly to make when it's 10 degrees below zero outside!

#### What you need:

- 10-12 foam sheets, available at craft stores
- · A ball-point pen
- Scissors
- Foam stickers, glitter, anything to decorate your mittens
- White glue
- 7" ribbon to hang wreath

#### What you do:

- 1. In pen, trace the outside of your hand in the shape of a mitten on foam sheets.
- 2. Cut out the mitten and decorate it with foam stickers or glitter, or cut out other shapes out of your leftover foam sheets.



- 3. Cut out small rectangles from a foam sheet of another color to be the mitten cuffs. Glue them to the bottoms of the mittens. You will need 12 mittens total to make this wreath.
- 4. When you are done with the individual mittens, glue the bottom corners and a little bit of the side to each other to form a circle. Alternate the mittens when gluing: under, over, etc.
- 5. Let the wreath dry.
- 6. Use a large foam sticker or white glue to adhere the ribbon to the back of one of the mittens to form a hook to hang up your wreath.

## The Vintners of Tokaji

Happy New Year 2017, or in Hungarian, "Boldog Új Évet Kívánok 2017." I hope your next 12 months are the best ever!

A few months back, our puzzle featured towns and villages of the Tokaji region of Hungary. This month's puzzle contains clues naming the various wine producers of the area.

Sweet Tokaji wine is considered one of the oldest and most valuable varietals in world. Bottles of this type of wine are still drinkable from vintages dating back to the 1700s. The precious and rare essencia wines contain less than 3% alcohol and are consumed in very small portions by sipping the thick nectar using miniature sized silver or crystal spoons.

Thomas Jefferson stocked his wine cellar with several cases of Tokaji each year. Composers Liszt, Schubert, Strauss and Wagner oftentimes celebrated the public releases of new compositions by hosting parties that featured Tokaji. The royal families of England, as well as the Habsburgs, owned several vineyards that produced Tokaji exclusively for their courts. Czarina Theresa Petronova of Russia so loved the wine that she had a company of troops stationed in the Tokaji region to protect her personal stock from thieves. Louis XIV of France was enamored with essencia and is credited with originating the phrase: "Tokaji, The King of Wines, The Wine of Kings!"

The Tokaji region has been producing wine since the 1300s, but it was not until Chaplain Laczkó Szepsi perfected the process of harvesting botrytised grapes that the first ever Aszú was produced and given as an Easter gift to Prince Rákóczi's wife Zsuzsanna Lorantffy in 1631.

Finding Tokaji wine may be a challenge but several online merchants can be found by conducting a Google search.

There are 20 clues in the January 2017 wordsearch. Each clue is the name of a particular winery that produces Tokaji Aszú and the names of the villages or towns they are located. Good luck, stay warm, BÚÉK and see you in February.
