Members in Ohio and New England may be eligible for scholarship grants

- submit an essay of at least 150 words entitled, "How I'm Involved in My Fraternal Society and Its Future";
- · submit a list of activities, including church, community, volunteer and school activities; and
- · submit a letter of recommendation from a local fraternal society officer.

IRAs & RMDs

When is it best to take your required minimum distribution?

IF YOU OWN AN IRA and are over age 70 ½, then you are familiar with the term "required minimum distribution," or "RMD," as it is commonly known. You are aware, then, that you need to take a required distribution from your IRA annually and that you must take it in a timely manner. But, that leaves a fairly wide window for taking the distribution.

William Penn Association (and all other IRA custodians) will let you know your RMD amount for the current year by Jan. 31 each year. This amount is calculated using a pre-set formula and your total account value as of Dec. 31 of the previous year. So, once you know your RMD for the year, should you take the RMD now, early in the year? Or, should you wait to take it later in the year, knowing that the RMD must be withdrawn by Dec. 31?

There really is no right or wrong answer to this question and, depending on your personal situation, either option can make sense. Here are a few factors to consider when making your decision.

Reasons to take your RMD early in the year

• You won't have to worry about the 50% penalty tax. RMDs generally must be taken by Dec. 31 for the year in which they are required in order to be considered "timely." There is one exception to this rule: for the first year in which you are subject to the RMD rules. In that case, the first distribution can be deferred until April 1st of the following year, but you will also be subject to the RMD for the current year, thereby creating a "double distribution" within that taxable year. For this reason, few people elect to defer the RMD in their first year of required distributions. Clients who miss this deadline subject themselves to a 50% penalty tax on the amount they were supposed to take but didn't.

Although Dec. 31 might seem like a long way off, consider taking your RMD now to avoid any potential for error. It's not uncommon for a member to postpone taking their RMD until later in the year, only to forget, become ill or otherwise preoccupied, leading to the deadline being missed. You have enough to worry about in retirement, but taking your RMD early in the year to avoid the potential of the 50% penalty shouldn't be one of them.

• You won't leave your beneficiaries with a tight with-drawal window. If a member that is subject to the RMD this year happens to pass away before taking the RMD, their beneficiaries are required to take what would have been the member's RMD. To avoid any potential for penalty, this distribution still has to take place before the end of the year.

The longer the member waits to take that RMD, the

more difficult it becomes to hit that deadline. If the insured member should pass away early in the year, there is probably more than enough time for their beneficiary to take any remaining RMD by year end. But, if the member passes away on Dec. 15, for example, it's highly unlikely that the distribution could be made in a timely manner to meet the deadline.


In order for the beneficiary to set up an "inherited IRA," they must provide proof of the member's death and complete the proper paperwork. In best-case scenarios, the death certificate only takes days to receive, but in certain circumstances, this process can take much longer. Plus, inherited IRAs can be funded only via a trustee-to-trustee transfer from the decedent's account, which can take several weeks in some cases.

Add all that together and it's easy to see why it may be next to impossible for a beneficiary to take a decedent's remaining RMD by the end of the year if the death occurs late in the year. Taking your RMD earlier in the year minimizes this issue.

• The remainder of the account can be rolled over and/ or converted. RMDs are considered to be the first money distributed out of an IRA account each year. RMDs are also not eligible to be rolled over. Put those two rules together and you'll notice that, if you are subject to the RMD this year, you must take your RMD for the year before you make any rollover or conversion to a Roth IRA. Failure to take your RMD before completing a rollover can lead to serious tax issues. For instance, the rolled-over RMD often becomes an excess contribution, subjecting the member to a 6% tax penalty for each year it remains in the new account until corrected.

Here's an example. Harry is age 72 and subject to RMDs. Harry's RMD this year is \$10,000, and he would like to roll \$100,000 over to another IRA that is paying more interest. Before taking his RMD, Harry rolls over \$100,000 from his account to another IRA. He then takes his \$10,000 RMD for the year from his remaining IRA by Dec. 31 and thinks he has satisfied his RMD requirements for the year. Harry files his taxes the following April like he always does, but his CPA notices an error. What error, you may ask? Well, remember the rule that the first money out of the IRA in any given year is deemed to be the RMD? Since the first \$10,000 that was rolled over was technically his RMD amount, that RMD cannot be rolled over and becomes an excess contribution to his new IRA, and will be subject to a 6% penalty tax every year until corrected. So, in essence, Harry only rolled over \$90,000 and has also taken an additional \$10,000 from his IRA this year, none of which was Harry's original intent.

Reasons to take your RMD later in the year

Now that we have explored some options for taking your RMD early in the year, let's discuss good reasons to wait until later in the year to take the distribution.

• Waiting will maximize tax deferral. When it comes to IRAs, tax deferral is the name of the game. The longer your money stays in an IRA, the longer earnings are shielded from taxation. By waiting until later in the year to take your distribution, you give that money almost another full year of additional tax deferral, thereby increasing the overall total in your account.

All interest that is earned on the RMD amount between now and the time of distribution will accrue within your IRA and will not be subject to taxation this year.

For example, let's return to Harry and his \$10,000 RMD. Let's suppose that Harry was in a WPA annuity currently earning 3.5% and decided to defer his RMD until the end of the year. Harry would earn close to \$350 in deferred earnings on his RMD amount that will stay in his account and help to increase the overall value of his IRA.

• Many members use the RMD as an extra "Christmas" bonus. While it's true that many of our members use their RMD to purchase Christmas gifts or distribute cash among their loved ones, this is a personal decision that only you can make.

As you can see, there are pros and cons to both sides of the RMD timing issue. One or the other will fit with your particular situation and help make your decision easier.

Here's one more thought on the RMD process here at William Penn Association. While it is our obligation to notify you of your required RMD amount in January, it is *your* responsibility to be sure to take the required minimum amount by the end of the year. Many of our members may be on "interest only" distributions, which may or may not satisfy your RMD requirement in any given year. That's why it's important to review your RMD each year to be sure you are not subjecting yourself to any unnecessary penalties.

Also, if you are currently under one of our "automatic" RMD options--by which we send you the required minimum distribution on an annual, quarterly or monthly basis--there is no need to contact us to verify whether your distributions will be sufficient or not. We have that information locked into our payout system and will automatically adjust your RMDs accordingly. You only need to notify us (in writing) should you wish to change anything on your RMD, such as the amount (above the minimum) or the tax withholding amounts. Other than that, once your election is in place, it should be smooth sailing!

Binge-watching, 1

IF YOU HAPPEN TO LIVE in Canada or the northern United States, you know how cold and long the weeks of late winter can feel. February, the shortest month, seems to drag on interminably, one gray day melting into the next, abbreviated by long nights and bitter chills.

Far from spring and the buoyancy of the yuletide holidays, these chilly days are the perfect time to bundle up on the couch and watch movies and television while we wait for warm weather to return. I hope that your winter-time viewing could include some Hungarian selections. This month's *Take* surveys some recent films and shows I have seen that have a Hungarian connection. A few are classics; others are fresh from the cinema.

I grew up watching old black and white movies and action flicks. What was available to me in the way of Hungary-related cinema was very limited. It was primarily old Hungarian-language movies on VHS tape. One often-watched favorite of my family was *Brady's* Escape, a film starring John Savage, about the trials and tribulations of an American bomber pilot shot down over Hungary in World War II. Avoiding roving German patrols, the pilot is taken in by Hungarian *csikós* (cowboys) and hidden by them for several months. The movie was filmed entirely in eastern Hungary and features the beautiful architecture of the Debrecen area. It is a unique and moving film.

Hungary is well known today for producing advanced auteurs who have mastered the cinematic medium. Hungarian films often fare well on the international film festival circuit. A few years back, the Hungarian-made and directed Son of Saul won best foreign language film at the Oscars. This year, Ildikó Enyedi's On Body and Soul is in the running for Oscar recognition. The work of writer Joe Eszterhas is also well known: Music Box is one of my favorite films and helped inspire me to go to law school. The late Vilmos Zsigmond, who captured some of the most stunning footage of the 1956 Revolution, was a wizard of cinematography. His eye behind the camera gave us the iconic images found in critically-acclaimed films like



The Deer Hunter, Deliverance, Close Encounters of the Third Kind and The Black Dahlia.

Hungary's rich musical heritage also stars in several famous films. *Doctor Zhivago* features one of the most famous on-screen examples of Hungarian-style Roma music, all the way down to the bouncing twang of the cimbalom. Similarly, The Inspector General starring Danny Kaye features several full-length songs performed on screen by a Hungarian folk band. If you are a Lord of the Rings fan, "Gollum's Theme" (or "Gollum's Menace") from *The Two Towers'* score prominently features the cimbalom: the bouncing notes give this recurring musical motif a hint of mental imbalance and apprehension that is central to understanding Gollum's character.

Recently, the prominence of Hungary, Hungarians, and Hungarian-Americans on the silver screen seems to be increasing. For example, I was surprised to see hundreds of Hungarian names in the credits of 2017's sci-fi blockbuster Blade Runner 2049, starring A-list celebrities Ryan Gosling, Robin Wright, Harrison Ford, and Jared Leto. It turns out that Blade Runner 2049 was principally filmed in Hungary.

Another example comes from the 2011 spy flick Tin-

ker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy. It's a cool thing to see the likes of Colin Firth and Gary Oldman speaking in Hungarian as they discuss a recent covert operation that went bad in Budapest. The first few scenes of the movie faithfully recreate what Cold War Budapest looked like, from the leather-clad Hungarian secret police to austere downtown cafés overlooking gloomy courtyards. It, too, was filmed partially in Hungary.

One of my most favorite recent comedies is *Spy*, starring Melissa McCarthy, Jude Law and Rose Byrne. It's a story about the bumbling exploits of an unlikely desk jockey turned covert operative as she conducts a trans-European manhunt for a notorious criminal. *Spy* was filmed almost entirely in Hungary; Budapest serves as a stand-in for Rome and London. But, the film's final act is set entirely in Hungary and features, among other things, rapper 50 Cent raving about gulyás. The climax takes place on the shores of Lake Balaton--truly a sight to behold. It is rare, in my experience, for the Veszprém County area to be featured in major Hollywood motion pictures, let alone one that was so commercially successful.

I'm personally looking forward to watching *Red Sparrow* when it comes out in March. Starring Jennifer

Lawrence and filmed in Hungary, *Red Sparrow* follows the adventures of a murderous female Russian operative.

If films are not your thing, then there's plenty of non-fiction television with a Hungarian twist. For example, *Anthony Bourdain*:

No Reservations went to Hungary, where he toured Szeged and Budapest with the aforementioned Vilmos Zsigmond. I personally find No Reservations to be cinematically beautiful, with stark and sharp images cross-cut with interesting

anecdotes and footage of delicious food. The Hungary episode intersperses some of Zsigmond's most famous camera work, both in Hollywood and during the Revolution, with stunning images of the Hungarian capital.

Bizarre Foods with Andrew Zimmern is also one of my favorite travel shows. In one episode, Zimmern went to Hungary, and in true fashion, was able to find his way into some of the most unique culinary experiences available in Hungary. My favorite part of that episode was when he explores Budapest's grand central market, the Nagyvásárcsarnok.

Rick Steves and other travel writers have frequented Hungary. I suggest that you check out those shows as well.

If history is more your thing, then check out "The Sultan's Heart" episode of Travel Channel's *Expedition* Unknown. This episode features Hungarian archaelogists trying to excavate sites near Szigetvár, Hungary, the site of a famous last-stand siege between the invading Ottomans and an outnumbered band of Hungarian and Croatian warriors. Sultan Suleiman the Magnificent--one of the greatest rulers of the Ottoman Empire--met his end in a tent on the Szigetvár battlefield (though he died of illness, not of combat wounds). Legend has it that the Ottomans secretly buried his heart in the spot where he died, while his other remains were sent back to Istanbul. The location of the buried heart-and its tomb--was lost to history, but this episode goes on location to literally dig up answers. I won't spoil anything, but I highly recommend this episode.

I hope this is enough to fill up your winter viewing schedule, and that you enjoy these movies and shows as much as I do. It is certainly fun to see famous actors and actresses romp around Hungary in many of the same places that I frequented on my travels there.

Inside this 'old house'

THEY DESCRIBE US in a fashion that is well below our true selves. We are often compared to an old, uncared-for home. The peeling paint and uprooted floor boards are signs of weathered storms and hundreds of gatherings.

citizenship than the clothes we wear.



- You're ready to give your valentine to your special friend and brighten their day!



Eligibility Rules for Year 2018 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing for four (4) years as of January 1, 2018.
- b) For both new and renewal applicants, the students must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2018 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a life benefit member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2018.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
 - d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period.
 - e) New applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc. Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of William Penn Life. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.wpalife.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "What one item would you place in a time capsule, and why?" If the essay exceeds 100 words, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Thursday, May 31, 2018. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2018 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, August 31, 2018.

- f) Renewal applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc. Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of William Penn Life. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.wpalife.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "What is the importance of having a life insurance policy?" If the essay exceeds 100 words, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Thursday, May 31, 2018. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2018 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, August 31, 2018.

- g) All applications and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed and faxed submissions will NOT be accepted.**
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc. once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student and to the parents and/or legal guardians of the applicant.
- k) All applications and essays must be mailed and postmarked by **Thursday, May 31, 2018**. Any applications and essays postmarked after that date will not be considered.

Skiing in Hungary

Now that we are mired smack dab in the middle of winter, with the Olympics occurring this month in South Korea, it is nice to know that the land of the Hussars does offer several noteworthy places to ski. I'd guess that 99% of the people who like to ski consider themselves recreational/amateur skiers at best. With that thought in mind, the slopes of Hungary are not of the caliber of a Vail, Aspen or even Kitzbühel, but what Magyar ski areas do offer are several high quality resorts with plenty of challenges. Most ski trails in Hungary are only an hour or so from Budapest.

One place offering fine skiing is a site which I had the opportunity to see back in 2014. It is only about a half an hour's drive away from my relatives' village of Csót. The Eplény is a stone's throw away from the quaint town of Zirc and is nestled within the Bakony Mountains. It offers 16 slopes with varying degrees of difficulty.

Other good places to ski are located within the Mátra, Bükk and Börzsöny mountain regions. The Visegrád, located a few kilometers from the Danube Bend, offers a breathtaking view of the river for those shushing down its trails. There are other resorts that have lodges of architectural significance, designed by the famed Imre Makovecz. The oldest and closest resort to the national capital is the Dobogókő, which was built in 1923. The Zsindelyes Inn is the focal point of this legendary winter retreat. The Bánkút is located in the Bükk National Park and was originally constructed for the Communist Youth Olympic Games which now also includes the Hungarian National Ski Museum.
