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

VOTE! It's your most important right

PITTSBURGH -- This month, many WPA members will have the chance to exercise one of their most important rights as American citizens: the right to vote.

In addition to exercising this great benefit of citizenship, many of you can exercise another important benefit that comes with membership in our Association: the right to vote for your branch officers. We encourage all eligible members to not only vote in your branch election but also consider seeking a branch office.

The procedure for conducting nominations and elections is spelled out in the WPA's By-Laws (Article VI, Sections 605 and 606).

Section 605. NOMINATIONS

Nominations for candidates for Branch office may be made from a nominating committee appointed by the Branch President. Such nominations may also be made from the floor at the annual meeting of the Branch in November or December of even number years by those members in attendance under Section 606.

Section 606. ELIGIBILITY AND ELECTION

1. ELIGIBILITY - Only an Adult Benefit Member who is at least age eighteen and who is not directly involved in litigation

or a written claim against the Association, except for claims under a certificate of insurance, is eligible to be a Branch Officer. No Full-Time Agent, General Agent, or anyone who is licensed to sell for another life insurance company, or a spouse of any of the above is eligible to be a Branch Officer.

2. ELECTION OF BRANCH OFFICERS - The election of Branch Officers

shall be held every two (2) years in even number years commencing in November or December 2012. Each Adult Benefit Member shall have one (1) vote for each office. Elections shall be by a majority of those present at such annual meeting. Officers elected at such annual meeting shall be installed immediately.

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Should I have a will or trust?

AS THE THANKSGIVING HOLIDAY approaches, I realize that most of us are looking forward to spending quality time with family and loved ones. I know I sure am! With that in mind, I thought I'd dedicate some time this month to review one of the most critical decisions a person can make when it comes to their family: the decision to have a properly designed will and/or trust

If you listened to any music in the last 40 years, you're probably familiar with the names Prince and Aretha Franklin. Both became huge celebrity singers and household names during their lifetimes. Prince and Franklin were indeed celebrated singers--icons who each defined a genre--and both will enjoy immortality through their contributions to the music community.

But, despite all that's commendable about their lives, there was one thing they both got devastatingly wrong: their legacy. You see, neither had a will. Prince never had kids, but Franklin is survived by four adult children, one of whom has special needs. As you may know, special-needs heirs are particularly vulnerable and depend on a sound estate plan for their continued care and support. This is just one reason why having a well-crafted will and/or trust is critical to ensuring that your wishes will be carried out as you intended.

Now, you may be thinking that these celebrity stories don't apply to you because your estate isn't worth tens of millions of dollars. Let's debunk that myth right now. It's not the amount of assets that you have that necessitates an estate plan but rather your legacy-or how you want to be remembered. Your legacy is not only how you will be remembered, but also about how your assets and personal property is distributed after you are gone.

Both wills and trusts are effective estate planning tools and serve an important purpose in your estate plan. Here are some of the differences between wills and trusts, and a few points about each:

Why create a will?


- A will names a personal representative (executor or executrix) to handle your final affairs. The personal representative has the power to execute all transactions as desired in your will.
- A will is the only document in which you can name a guardian for your children, which might be necessary if you have young children or a specialneeds child who requires ongoing care.



- A will is an official document that provides a detailed account of what assets you have--both personal and financial--and what you want to do with those assets.
- A will prevents your estate from becoming public record.
- A will prevents relatives you hardly know from appearing to stake a claim on your assets.
- Most importantly, a will tells the courts your wishes.

Prince's estate sat in a Minnesota probate court for quite some time before his sister and five half-siblings were eventually named his heirs. That situation is far from ideal because prolonged court time means that more fees continue to bleed money from the estate and leaves the heirs with fewer assets. I once had a client tell me that his sister died intestate (without a will) and her family fought over her assets for nearly three years. He said this process literally tore that family apart and drained her estate with ongoing legal fees and expenses before it was finally settled. In addition to the reductions in assets that go to the heirs, this also means additional pain and suffering for the heirs as they battle each other or simply try to figure out what is fair.

Agents' Corner



Why use a trust?

- A living trust enables you to avoid probate court, which can take a lot of time, be very expensive and make your private affairs open to the public.
- You need a living trust in case you become incapacitated.
- You can include specific instructions for trust management and disbursement when you die, which is important if you want to delay an inheritance to a milestone birthday, such as 25 or 30.
- A trust can be very important if you have minor children or a child who is disabled. The trust can be used as a tool for financial management to take care of those who aren't able to make those decisions for themselves.
- If you have a special-needs child, you should consider a special-needs trust. This type of trust offers an additional benefit: it doesn't interfere with any government benefits the recipient might be receiving already.
- Certain types of trusts may protect your assets from inclusion in the Medicaid asset formula for nursing home qualification.

Both Prince and Aretha Franklin waited too long

and died without making their wishes known. The most important take-away from this article is this: don't wait. If you have been thinking about drafting (or updating) your will or establishing a trust, now is the time to consult with an estate attorney. There are even "do-it-yourself" will kits available online that you can fill out, print and sign. Although these might not be as comprehensive as a will drafted by your attorney, they can be seen as a "better-than-nothing" alternative in that you can at least name your personal representative and direct your assets to your heirs as you want.

Although your WPA representative or broker can't give legal advice, he or she can be a valuable resource and, along with your attorney and accountant, should be considered part of your estate planning team. Your WPA representative or broker can help you through your decision-making process and make sure your life insurance and annuity beneficiaries are up-to-date, and that the coverage is sufficient to satisfy the wishes in your estate plan.

Digging up your Magyar roots

Researching your genealogy via interviews & the Internet

OVER THE YEARS, I have mentioned several times my belief that knowing your past is the key to predicting your future. I have heard from a number of *Take* readers asking if I can help them discover more about their own family history. I offer what little insight I can, as I have the same tools to conduct research as anyone else: time (more is better), a strategy, organizational skills and patience. I've written about my own personal genealogical and historical research in the past (*WPL* June 2017), but this month, I offer a couple of lessons learned for those who might be looking to do a little research of

I applaud anyone who wants to know about their family history. It is never too late and don't get discouraged.



Start by organizing what you already have. Assemble old paperwork in an order that makes sense to you. Don't throw away documents because they are written in Hungarian as they may possess valuable details when translated. Assess who in your family might have recollections of things or persons from previous generations and ask them for photos that may be locked away in a cedar chest or strongbox. If you receive old photos, ask the person who provided them to jot down the names of those in the photo and their relationship to the family. Remember to take a digital copy of that old picture and save it to your computer, as paper photos begin to deteriorate within 25 years if not protected from sunlight and moisture.

Next, talk to older members of Hungarian churches or clubs to which your ancestors belonged. Oftentimes, such persons will be more than happy to share their memories and artifacts with you. Ask for permission to audio/video record your conversations, then do so, if permitted. Follow basic journalistic practices when posing questions: Ask who, what, when, where, why and how.

Once your local and immediate family research has been exhausted, it is time to expand to other geographic locales within the United States. I'd recommend going to the website of Ellis Island, which is part of the National Park System (www.libertyell-isfoundation.org).

The website holds a treasure trove of arrival records on more than 65 million people who came through Ellis Island over a 134-year span. Ellis Island holds records dating back to 1820 and continued to when the facility closed in 1954. You can spend countless hours and be easily distracted from your task by the many interesting secondary menus the website has to offer. It is helpful to have names, dates and addresses as you attempt to find out about family that entered through this lo-

cation. Keep in mind that Ellis Island took in the vast majority – though not all – of the Hungarian immigrants who entered America between 1880 and 1920.

Be cognizant of misspellings and inverted dates when researching. I know a fellow American Magyar who discovered that the spelling of the family surname was changed six times by port officials. As we all know, Hungarian phonology does not always translate cleanly into English: "Tibor" could become "Tim" and "Ildiko" could become "Ida" quite easily.

A reader asked if visiting Ellis Island in person would speed up the research. It is definitely worth a visit, but for a beginner genealogist/historian, working with physical archives is likely to be inefficient. Visit Ellis Island for the intrinsic beauty and value of the place, but maybe inspect archives later on in your searching.

PART 2: Researching in Hungary

Most of us go to Hungary as typical tourists wanting to experience the countryside and to meet up with family. While traveling to the home of your ancestors to research your family history can be exciting and rewarding, I can

Point to Ponder....

Several of my college and work associates have discussed with me their family trees and how they can trace their lineages back to the 1700s. Some have copies of ship tickets and indentured servant papers proving how their descendants got to America. One colleague possessed documentation detailing such obscure facts as crop production and weekly weather. I applauded my co-workers' multigenerational diligence in retaining family documentation. I posed two questions in response, which I hope resonate with all of you: What are they doing to ensure that this information will be passed down to future generations, including the minute details of their own lives? - Tibor

attest from personal experience that it can be a difficult, frustrating and very time-consuming endeavor.

Chances are you will struggle to get help from public authorities in tracing family histories, and there is little ready access to records in the larger cities.

Interestingly, if your ancestors arrived in America from Hungary before 1930 or so, it is likely that they originally came from a small village. Those Magyars who arrived during World War II or later were usually from the bigger cities, and even big city residents may have come from more humble roots.

As I have mentioned in previous *Takes*, most birth, death and marriage records before 1940 are housed in the village churches. I do not know if such documentation has been transferred to a central location within the government or church domains. Perhaps one of my readers can enlighten us.

My father and I attempted to find some church records about our family while in Hungary only to learn that the priest delegates the responsibility to the church secretary. It turned out that 75-year-old secretary was also the sacristan and custodian. The ledgers containing the information were housed in a remote and dimly lit room under the choir loft, stowed away in a dusty metal cabinet with no lock but a huge bent nail that served as the latch for the hasp. The record books were heavy and not in any order. We had no interpreter and attempting to use Google Translate put a look of apprehension on the face of the secretary. So, we decided to end our brief Indiana Jones-esque research adventure.

Our cousins told us this is how the records in the small churches are kept throughout Hungary. Out of respect for the priest and secretary, we gave each 5,000 forints to the church for their time and minimal effort. Being that this short-lived research session occurred on a Friday morning and with an afternoon trip to Lake Balaton awaiting us, the frustration of not finding details of our family history was a mere afterthought.

If you really want to do research in Hungary, make sure you have lots of time, money, patience and an interpreter if you do not speak and read Hungarian well. I would suggest such research as a later step in your historical investigation as a way to supplement what information you have gathered by other means.

Part 3: Researching on the Internet

Just 30 years ago, the Internet began to emerge as the greatest referencing tool ever. But, every piece of written or printed information needs to be scanned or photographed before it can enter an electronic database, and that task can take years. Decision-makers have to prioritize what will be converted first for web access and what will have to wait for a later conversion. Although the task

of scanning documents requires minimal training, it is a very time-consuming and rather slow process. I knew a person who worked for a major medical facility that was converting its entire collection of medical records and billing to electronic images, and it was estimated that it would take a team of eight persons working three shifts over 10 years to complete the job.

At the little church in Hungary, those hand-scribed records are way down on the priority list for electronic conversion. Eventually, most if not all printed materials will be digitized, but how long it will take to do so is unknown.

Compared to even five years ago, there are many more records and documents available on the Internet, but it is oftentimes difficult and tedious to find the website containing the information you seek. Luckily, the web offers a researcher the ability to do such inquiries from the comfort of home and at your leisure.

Personal records and interviews will always be the best form of researching your Magyar genealogy, but most of us have very little access to those resources. Thus, if we want to know about our predecessors, the information kept by government and church authorities in Hungary is the only other option. In theory, the longer you wait, the more likely the documents you seek will be digitized and made available for research.

There are so many genealogical sites out there that a person could become quickly overwhelmed, discouraged and even duped into paying money for information that is intended to be free of charge. Just be wary and use your common sense. If you end up paying for custom research from a professional genealogist, do your own due diligence to understand what you are buying.

Recently, I rediscovered an organization that caters to those whose roots can be traced back to the Austro-Hungarian Empire and is based in the area where I grew up. The Hungarian Genealogical Society of Greater Cleveland (www.hungariangensocietycleveland.org) was formed in 1996. Its members meet six times a year as they work in a collaborative manner on genealogical research. Over the years, an impressive list of printed material and websites has been compiled by this group with special categories for American and international websites. Over 75 sources specific to Austro-Hungarian genealogical data are available via the aforementioned site. The list includes subcategories for Slovak, Ukrainian and Croatian websites.

To my knowledge, this is one of the best websites from which an American-Hungarian can launch their research. I applaud the members of this organization for their efforts in establishing such an impressive and helpful place to begin an ancestral inquiry.

I hope these tips enhance your pursuit of your own personal history.





- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "What are you doing to improve your world (community, church, school, family)?" If the essay exeeds 100 words or is on the incorrect topic, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, May 31, 2019. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2019 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, August 30, 2019.

f) **RENEWAL Applicants** must submit the following:

- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of William Penn Life. - 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "How has your family history influenced you?" If the essay exeeds 100 words or is on the incorrect topic, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, May 31, 2019. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2019 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, August 30, 2019.

- g) All applications and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed and faxed submissions will NOT be accepted.** Any applications and essays postmarked after **Friday, May 31, 2019** will not be considered.
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student and to the parents and/or legal guardians of the applicant.

A country in name only

Most of us are either second, third or even fourth generation American-Magyars. My great-grandparents came to America around the time of World War I. My knowledge of Hungarian is limited to probably 500 words or so, but I hold a great pride in being a Magyar. With that said, I spend a considerable amount of time researching any subject that is Hungarian. Most of my research is performed via the Internet where I oftentimes find interesting topics that are eventually used as themes for the monthly wordsearch puzzles.

The theme for this month's puzzle came to me by accident but was actually there under my nose, so to speak, without me ever realizing it. While standing in line for kolbász and corn at this year's WPA Picnic, I overheard a conversation between two gentlemen who were standing in line near me. Each gent kept calling the other either a Croation or Russian. It was not until a third person addressed the two men as Mr. Horvath and Mr. Orosz did I realize that their surnames were the Hungarian words for countries.
